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Editorial By James Read



These summer months set Meppershall apart as a place to live. The harvest will soon begin in the fields of wheat and barley that stretch for miles and miles between our Mid Bedfordshire villages. Like a rippling sea of every shade of green and gold, the waves of the summer breeze roll across the ripening crops and that unique Meppershall sunset bathes our hilltop and the landscape around us in its warm, rural light. It comes at first in its yellow gold of the afternoon, darkening to the red gold of the evening and, finally, reaching its crescendo in the crimson skyline that we see, unbroken, across the open land in our heart-of-England countryside.

Within this beauty, we've accommodated more homes and continued to build a strong, well-defined village – enjoying its own strong identity, its rural location and its relationship to neighbouring villages and towns, separated by miles of fields. So, on the lanes and footpaths in the sunset, cyclists can make their way home on quiet lanes. Walkers can stroll back home on footpaths disturbed only by the lonely song of a yellowhammer, the mesmerising spell of a corn bunting's trill or a friendly nod from a village friend. Even the hares, normally bounding down the field margins, seem to stop and contemplate these magical summer moments.

People love this place for all sorts of reasons. None that love it would sell it. Owning a piece of this God-given landscape is a privilege, with the rich and rewarding responsibility of curating the countryside we stand on, carving out a living from the lush life of the land. I think that's why so many were deeply hurt and distressed to see landowners offering fields for development in blocks that linked Stondon, Henlow, Meppershall, Clifton and Shefford, in the Central Bedfordshire Council planning department's "Call For Sites". There can be no doubt that any development must preserve the distinct villages of our part of the world and the soft margins and open fields that separate them. Nobody wants the next generation to inherit a village where the song of rare birds is gone, the roads are never quiet, the crops no longer grow, hares disappeared and the sunset framed by suburban overspill on once beautiful hills stretching from the Hertfordshire border to Broom, Haynes and Clophill.

Big developers want to build blocks of similar houses, at high density, on land that is cheap to build on (green fields and wild areas). That's their model. We can oppose those schemes and still support the provision of additional homes. The homes that local people will more readily support are truly integrated with the village within our rural setting. They are green (in every sense), they are well connected, well served and they offer a dignity and a small-scale characterful beauty that denies the captivity and large-scale dystopia now blighting parts of the countryside. I am not deriding the recent builds in Meppershall. Planning for Woodlands Rest included restoration of the thick hawthorn hedge that once lined Shefford Road in that place. Some hope. Sold as a remedial conservation measure to console those with environmental concerns, let's see if that hedge ever meaningfully reappears.

If all this is too exciting (or emotional) for you, remember there's tea and cake at the village hall (page 10). That will make everything okay.

A Message From Alistair Strathern, Our MP

It has been another busy few moments for me working on behalf of Meppershall and all our towns and villages. While the last month included some significant moments in Parliament, including welcome announcements in the Spending and Defence reviews and votes on the Assisted Dying bill, the highlight as always was getting out and about across the constituency to focus on your priorities.

I'm incredibly grateful to everyone in Meppershall who came along to my village hall Q&A event at Meppershall Village Hall. These are an important opportunity for me to ensure I am on top of the priorities and concerns of each of the towns and villages I represent, and my work as your MP is always better for your input, support and challenge.

One big priority has of course been pushing for action from CBC highways to finally resurface Shefford Road. I was very glad to finally secure a commitment for action on this, but the battle continues to ensure CBC prioritise the much-needed investment so many of our local roads are crying out for.

Access to GPs remains a challenge for far too many too. Nationally, I have been glad to support the Health Secretary's work to hire over a thousand more GPs, but we need to see the impact of this locally. That's why I have been pushing the local NHS to invest in extra facilities for Shefford Health Centre. I am glad that work is now finally underway to provide a total of 4 additional clinical rooms on site by the end of Summer. When fully utilised, this should enable the surgery to hold up to 24,000 extra much needed appointments a year.

Championing our local schools like Meppershall Church of England primary is a big priority for me too. I was delighted we secured a space for Meppershall in the Government's free breakfast club pilot scheme. Recently it was a pleasure to join the team to celebrate Meppershall pre-school joining their trust, enabling greater support for fantastic childcare locally. I know CBC's stalled 3 to 2 tier transition, and pressures on SEND provision remain big issues, and I continue to campaign for action on these.

Fly-tipping continues to be a serious concern in Meppershall and across our countryside. It's not just an eyesore – it's illegal, dangerous, and deeply frustrating for those affected. I am glad the Government is taking these concerns seriously and that

under new measures, fly-tippers will now have their vans seized and crushed as a consequence. Rest assured I'll be pushing local authorities to ensure they make full use of these powers to protect our countryside from the blight of fly tipping.

Our villages matter. Whether it's defending our local environment or improving our public transport, I'll keep standing up for the issues that matter to you. If I can ever be of any help, please get in touch with me and my team at Alistair.strathern.mp@parliament.uk

- Your thoughts on trust, accuracy and community


Why this matters: Through this kind of research, your insight could have a critical impact on helping researchers, policymakers and your neighbours better understand how news spreads in villages across the UK.



Meppershall Second Sunday Strollers

On Sunday 13th July we will leave the church gate at 2.00PM for a tour of Shillington – down to All Saints Shillington (the church on the hill in the vale between Meppershall and the Chiltern Hills at Pegsdon) and back. We will walk via Cow Bridge and along the River Hit to Shillington, returning via Shillington Bury and back up the hill to Meppershall. Importantly, there should be a chance to grab a Sunday tea at All Saints Shillington, which they serve throughout the summer on Sunday afternoons (although teddy bear abseiling will also be taking place – might be busy!)



In total the walk is around 5 miles, and this month it will kindly be led by Alan and Ann who are a familiar presence in our walking group and experienced long distance walkers!

Last month we had a great afternoon walking across to the recently opened Clophill Lakes Nature Reserve, situated just south of Clophill. Centred around the quarry lakes - which were created by many years of mining of Fuller's Earth at the site – The Greensand Trust acquired the site in February 2022. After 3 years of habitat restoration, conservation and site preparation, it opened to the public as a nature reserve on 5th April, 2025, featuring a car park (fees raising income for the site) and a tea/coffee counter (please check opening times). The Trust also runs the adjacent Sandy Smith Nature Reserve. Our strollers returned on foot after a total of 8 miles.



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

Meppershall Messenger AGM

The Annual General Meeting of your village magazine took place on 7th June. Approved minutes will follow in due course, but we wanted to share some of the key areas discussed.

After years of saving and astute financial planning, the magazine has replaced its printing machinery (please note the magazine can provide a community printing service for local organisations at a small cost – contact John Thompson for more information).

We are very thankful to our advertisers – along with donations and grants, they keep our finances on track. The magazine offers great value to advertisers – reaching every home in Meppershall for a modest annual cost, unchanged for several years now.

We are going to look at including informal summaries of Meppershall Parish Council meetings, courtesy of our roving reporter, since official MPC minutes cannot usually be accessed before the monthly deadline. The first example is included in this issue.

We receive good feedback on the magazine (thank you!) and we continue to build our online circulation. We are so grateful to all of the contributors to The Meppershall Messenger and we recognised them in the Editor’s Report at the meeting.

Covering every home in the village at no cost to the reader, the magazine has a print run of some 1,090 copies each month, which are delivered in 37 volunteer delivery rounds. The importance of the physical printed magazine was highlighted by the recent successful village survey, which was predominantly returned on paper rather than online (both were easily available).

New ideas raised at the AGM included a crossword, a “Wild Meppershall” page, recipes, info from local attractions and partnerships with local schools. We also discussed the opportunity to provide info and news focused on specific age groups across the village – particular the older community (eg. New Meppershall Care Home) and the younger community (school-age and young adult). If you can help in any of these areas, if you would like to write for the magazine occasionally or regularly, please get in touch!

At the meeting we clarified how we are governed by revising the constitution, confirming that there are three principal roles responsible for the magazine. They are the Editor (James Read), the Treasurer (John Thompson) and Advertising and Distribution Manager (Andrew Pain). Each of these roles was re-elected at the meeting. We are additionally fortunate to have a great group of volunteers supporting all sorts of other processes and roles in support of the magazine. Patrick O’Connor recently joined the team as an Assistant Editor. 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
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Meppershall Parish Council (MPC) – Key points and summary of recent meetings

MPC meetings took place on 12th May and 9th June 2025

Elections

Mr John Parsons was elected Chairman for the year 2025-2026

Mrs Roma Avrili was elected Vice-Chair for the year 2025-2026

Chairmans Announcements

- Successful Annual Parish meeting noting it would have been nice to have more residents present, but that attendance by organisations was very good. Village organisations making presentations included MAPTA, Munchkins, Wanderbus, Meppershall Messenger, Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group and the Village Hall. - Meppershall has been shortlisted in this year's CPRE Bedfordshire Living Countryside Awards! The winners will be announced at the beginning of July.

Questions / comments from the public:

- Property owner at the top end of Fildyke Road is concerned with parking in the off-road bays and further down the road. A resident is parking at least 5 cars in these bays therefore making it impossible for anyone else to park there. This results in cars parking on the road at a very narrow point on Fildyke Road opposite the pub, or on the bend opposite the entrance to Brookmead. This parking causes problems for the flow of traffic through the village and is potentially an accident waiting to happen. Is there anything that can be done to prevent this one resident taking up so many parking spaces? *Council agreed that there is nothing they can do to help alleviate this situation as highways is not an MPC remit. Council suggests that the property owner contact CBC and the Police regarding dangerous parking and possibly Grand Union Housing Group if the resident parking so many cars is one of their tenants.*
- Would the Clerk be able to provide draft minutes for publication in the Messenger? *Council agreed that the Clerk would provide minutes in a summary form.*

Consultations and Legal

Stocken House

- Planning discharge of conditions applications regarding site levels and play equipment installation are currently pending a decision with CBC. It is evident from reports submitted by officers on the planning portal that there are objections to the amendments requested by Davidsons as part of the request to discharge planning conditions. The Clerk will monitor this and seek to provide accurate information to residents.

IT and Communications

- Creation of the Meppershall.org website and amendments to the MPC gov.uk website is now in progress after the Clerk met with Miss Standbridge of Iris Web Media. The Clerk also advised of a request to provide email addresses to

members of the Meppershall FC management team. It was noted that all organisations in Meppershall can apply for a meppershall.org email address.

Finance

Purchase orders approved for

- Dog poop bags.
- Goal clips and ties, and jack for goal post removal.
- Chain and lock for access from track to Centenary Field
- Welding for repair to Storage Container
- Pallet load of topsoil for Centenary Field
- All purchases included within budget and in Schedule of Delegation to Clerk.

Grant applications approved

- Purchase and gift 2 rainbow coloured picnic benches to MAPTA.
- Gifting of PC Stores to Meppershall Village Hall.

Document approval

- Approved to amend banking mandate

Budget v Actual

- The Clerk provided Council with a budget v actual report for 2024-2025. Councillors raised no questions.

Annual accounts

- The Clerk presented the current Asset Register to councillors for review and its' contents as of 31st March 2025 were noted to be valued at £155,179. Additional play equipment purchased after this date to be added. It was noted that MPC insurance needs to be amended due to new play equipment.
- Review of earmarked reserves conducted and amended as required.
- The Clerk provided both the signed AGAR Internal Auditor Report and the separate report to councillors. Council expressed thanks to the Clerk for having received an Internal Auditor Report without issues.
- Council approved the Governance Statement and the Accounting Statements for submission to the External Auditor checking the bank reconciliation to accompany it.

Orders for the payment of money

- Schedules of payments as presented to Council were approved and authorised for payment

Planning applications

- Objection to CB/25/01405/FULL - Land North of Fildyke Road, Meppershall - Erection of four dwellings (Use Class C3) including two bungalows with associated private drive and landscaping. Reasons for objection due to but not limited to; outside settlement envelope, change to visual appearance and character of village. Councillors agreed that after reviewing revised drawings submitted for this planning application that there was no reason to alter the previous objection submitted.
- No objection to CB/25/01102/FULL - 5 Church Road, SG17 5NA - Two storey part single rear and side extension, internal alterations and creation of Juliet balcony to front elevation.

- No objection to CB/25/01508/FULL - Hoo Farm, Chapel Road, SG17 5NQ - The closing up of two existing accesses and the creation of a new singular access.
- No objection to CB/25/01407/FULL - 1 Orchard Close, SG17 5LW - Conversion of garage into a habitable space and the change to a pitch roof, with roof lights.
- No objection to pre-consultation request from WHP Telecoms Limited regarding Meppershall Water Tower, Stondon Road, Meppershall, SG17 5NG – replacement antenna and associated works. Councillors noted that whilst the water tower is referred to as Meppershall Water Tower it is actually in the parish of Stondon and WHP should be advised of this.

Neighbourhood Plan

- The Chair of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group advised the Village Questionnaire closed on 18th May with only a few questionnaires still to collect. There are now 583 paper responses that need to be input into the MPC website. Each survey takes just under 5 minutes to input therefore there is circa 49 hours of data entry work required. Council approved hire of data entry clerk to input the data.
- Responses to the Youth survey have been disappointing so another approach for this may be required.
- Next steps are to contact CBC regarding SEA screening and to organise Housing Needs survey and Design Codes.

Highways and Transport

- **To consider how to address issue of some wheelchair users using the road instead of the footpaths on Shefford Road due to the poor state of the footpaths.** The Chairman advised that this issue was raised at the Annual Parish meeting, and it has since been confirmed that some residents have resorted to purchasing off road wheelchairs due to the state of the footpaths. Those in the poorest state are those at the junction of Shefford Road and Hoo Road, on Shefford Road in front of the old Foresters cottages, near the Care Home opposite 80 Shefford Road and between Emery Croft and Orchard Close. Councillors agreed that it cannot be acceptable that people must push wheelchairs in the road due to the poor state of footpaths as this creates a health and safety issue. The Clerk was asked to contact Ward Councillor Stephenson to request help in raising the issue with CBC Highways.
- **Update on Shefford Road repairs / re-surfacing** - Shefford Road will be closed from 23rd June from the roundabout up to Stocking Drive to enable Civils, resurfacing works with Paco and road marking works to take place in safety.
- **Woodlands Rest raised tables on site** – CBC's Highways Agreements Team Leader confirmed via email that CBC are not satisfied with the speed table in its current state and have communicated this to Davidsons Homes. It does not meet CBC's adoptable standard but has also not been flagged as a safety issue. As the estate roads are not yet ready to be put forward for adoption (and there is no Section 38 agreement in place at present), the roads remain private. As such, Davidsons retain full autonomy to do their works in the order of their choosing. CBC can again tell Davidsons that this work requires doing, but the only timescale that they need to work to is prior to offering the road up for

adoption. Therefore, there is little that CBC can offer in terms of a date by which remedial works be done.

- **Footpath on Shefford Road / High Street (from Poppy Gardens to Crackle Hill Road)** - The Clerk has written to CBC's S278 Agreement Team for an update on the progress of the construction of a footpath on Shefford Road / High Street (from Poppy Gardens to Crackle Hill Road) that was part of conditions of planning approval given for CB/21/00053/FULL - 1 Shefford Road, Meppershall, Shefford, SG17 5LJ. Update pending.
- **Footpath on Fildyke Road** - The Clerk has written to CBC's S278 Agreement Team for an update on the progress of the construction of a footpath on Fildyke Road that was part of conditions of planning approval given for the following sites: CB/17/02409/FULL- New Close Nurseries, Fildyke Road, Meppershall – see also CB/19/02994/VOC and CB/18/04569/FULL - Tower View Nurseries, 81 Fildyke Road, Meppershall, Shefford, SG17 5LU – see also CB/19/02679/VOC. Update pending.
- **Damaged street signs.** Marywells and Church Road damaged signs reported to CBC who advise they will not repair.

Environment and Leisure

Update on allotments

- The Clerk needs to issue some new contracts.
- Mrs Thorne advised that two notices to quit need to be issued.
- The allotment gate has been left open on several occasions.
- The Clerk is progressing with a new fence installation.
- Councillor Merryweather advised that he will be attending the National Allotment Society AGM.

Update on Old Road Meadow

- UKPN will be carrying out works in Old Road Meadow to reduce the height of trees and hedges under power lines.
- Additional benches approved for purchase and installation near the play area of Old Road Meadow.

Update on Centenary Field

- MPC staff confirmed that the top end of Centenary Field near the newly installed play equipment have always been areas where litter accumulates due to the wind pushing it into the hedging etc. Councillors agreed that an additional bin in this location would not resolve this problem and noted that there were already 5 bins on Centenary Field.
- Council approved request from Shefford Children's Centre to hold a free play in the park session on Wednesday 28th May (am) free of charge.
- Council approved a pitch hire agreement with new Meppershall FC to use pitch on Sundays free of charge.

To consider maintaining grounds, boundaries and hard spaces around the Village Hall.

- At the Village Hall Management Committee meeting on 12.05.25, members agreed that they should contact MPC to ask whether MPC would be willing to

maintain the grounds, boundaries and hard spaces around the Village Hall as a service to the village and to enhance recreation areas. Within the grounds there are several seating areas / benches which are used by people visiting the social club as well as friends and families watching / waiting for their children whilst playing. Councillors agreed that more information was required on this matter and that it would be better to appoint a working group to liaise with the Village Hall Management Committee to better understand their request and what the possible cost implications might be.

Update on all other environment and leisure issues

- The Clerk has found that the East Anglian Air Ambulance service runs free of charge defib / CPR training and would like to progress with organising a session for the village later in the year. Councillors agreed that this would be a great idea.
- Mr Hirst is investigating the availability of electricity for use by the village from the old box for the old temporary Village Hall.

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
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
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
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morning - to have a cup of coffee and set herself up for the day looking out on the garden and giving a different aspect to view the garden.

Gardens are now in full flow with endless colour and scent adorning the beds. This is the time of year when gardens get used the most - enjoyed as an extra room of the house and an extension of the indoor space... be it for barbeques, entertaining, hot tub parties, a quiet cuppa, afternoon teas, paddling pools a game of swing ball or hide and seek. They are such versatile places so make sure you make full use of yours. Give some thought to where you normally sit. Where the sun and shade are for the type of area you want to create.

Colours of plants can also enhance the mood of the garden you are trying to create. For a tropical feel, use hot colours reds oranges and purples. For a relaxed feel, pastel shades and white gardens are tremendously soothing.

Garden accessories and types of furniture also help you create the style of garden you desire. Use natural materials for a cottagey or wildlife garden. For a contemporary look go modern with corten steel, clean lines and metal furniture. Lighting can also be used to highlight areas of interest. Be it a few solar lights to give a fairy-like glow or festoon lights around a patio to use whilst entertaining – these all enhance the garden and means you can use it in the evening too.

Whatever you choose there is something for everyone's taste, so you can make the most of your space and enjoy your garden to its fullest, regardless of size and aspect.

Trugs And Trowels (Campton Gardening Club Newsletter) - July

Summer is in full swing and hopefully your gardens are performing splendidly to the warm weather. Gardening club members were delighted with their visit to Gravenhurst to Lynda Cole's commercial flower growers - a truly inspirational insight to what can be achieved locally, the sky's the limit. In the many years of organising local speakers it never ceases to amaze me what we have on our doorstep, the vast knowledge, talent and enthusiasm. The second half of 2025 is no exception - including a speaker talking about historic usage of herbs.

July is a time to be enjoying the fruits of our labour, taking some time to sit back and having a little me time with friends and family.

If not done already, it's the best time to assist our blooms and vegetables with plant foods regularly. Many different types are available – and don't forget your indoor plants. Keep deadheading to create new growth also pinching out your tomatoes. Do your daily watering - early morning or evening, never during the day. Ensure you lift your mower height throughout the warm weather, this will help prevent grass burning in the hot sun.

Now, there's lots of advice out there on how best to care for and enhance your tomatoes... I have seven tips here, but I must say I have not tried them all:

1. Epsom salt: two tablespoons in a hole before transplanting.
2. Baking soda: sprinkle around the base, adjusting acidity for a sweeter taste.
3. Pinching out.
4. Used coffee grounds mixed into soil.
5. Adding kelp meal to compost.
6. Egg shells in hole before transplanting or planting prevents rot.
7. Bonemeal – adds the much-needed nutrient phosphorus for healthy juicy fruit.

Happy growing to you all whichever methods you use.

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AirBnB Adventures By Patrick O'Connor

After the very expensive business of my divorce I needed to find money to pay off my debts. About a year ago I decided to let two of my rooms on AirBnB. The results have been pleasing and surprising, leaving me with a string of memories and friendships.

Guests have come from America, Colombia, China, Kashmir, India, South Africa, Spain, Hungary, Romania, Australia, Ireland, and even the UK. Why would they visit little Meppershall in the English countryside? Actually, it is a convenient location for many reasons: handy for airports, good rail links to London and the north, halfway between Oxford and Cambridge. They come for work, to visit friends and families, or on holiday journeys.

A Swedish couple stayed with their two dogs. I joined the lady for a dog walk around the church, and had to explain how to use the kissing gate. Just explained. Two lovely ladies were attending a weekend course on horse massage at a farm in Shillington. When they asked about transport I could not resist offering to provide it, and in return they took me out to dinner. Win-win!

I have had children and dogs to stay. My sons' old toys, boxed for years, have enjoyed a second spring.

Almost without exception they have been remarkably excellent guests, friendly and interesting. I let them use the kitchen and living room, and several of them have taken over the cooking. A charming Chinese family told me "please leave the kitchen, we are cooking". I backed out, they brought in boxes of food. I laid the table with bowls and chopsticks, and they prepared a wonderful Chinese dinner. They insisted on clearing the kitchen, and next morning made a tasty Chinese breakfast, noodles and dimsums.

Two different guests were escaping marital problems, so I provided counselling based on my experiences. A young couple had an argument, but I believe they have made up since!

What are the downsides? Hardly any. My washing machine and dishwasher are very busy and my water bill has risen. I do a lot of bed making. But otherwise life continues normally, and with more sociability. And the money rolls in!

CBC Community Grant Funding Applications Are Open

Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) has announced a third round of UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF/REPF) community grants – aiming to support local economic and community development. The initiative aims to improve or provide new community spaces and facilities, with grants available up to £25,000, to be spent by the end of the year.

Voluntary, community and social enterprise groups, and town and parish councils in Central Bedfordshire are able to apply for a portion of the £150,000 fund. The deadline for applications is Friday 25 July 2025. This UKSPF scheme supports the council's commitment to invest in the well-being and development of local communities. With a focus on inclusivity, innovation, and sustainability, this scheme provides financial support to projects that address community needs and create lasting impact.

There is a 'match funding' requirement of 20% and things like planning permission etc must have been previously sought. Applications must meet at least one of the following UKSPF intervention objectives:

- Create or enhance community and neighbourhoods, such as buildings, facilities, or green spaces, and increase resilience to natural hazards, such as flooding
- Support local community-based groups and organisations to develop their capacity and infrastructure, such as equipment, sports equipment and engagement, or improvements to facilities
- Establish or improve local green spaces, such as parks, gardens, or woodlands, and promote their environmental, community and social benefits
- Invest in capital assets that support local arts, cultural and creative activities, such as venues, equipment, or materials.

CBC and Community Voluntary Service (CVS) have run 'Meet the Funder' sessions to help groups understand the grant criteria and submit effective applications. Recordings are available – contact community.grants@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk. Find out more at:

Councillor Tracey Wye, Chair of the UKSPF Local Partnership Group, described the success of the scheme in previous years, saying, "We saw some brilliant investment locally with these grants in the first two rounds; from upgrading local children's parks, to improving facilities by renovating them and giving them a new lease of life."

She encouraged those interested to use the 'Meet the Funder' sessions, to check eligibility and get advice on submitting a good application.

Receiving A Windfall: Personal Finance By Paul Savuto

The phrase 'windfall' is used to refer to a sum of money that is received suddenly or unexpectedly. This could take the form of a lottery win, for example, or more commonly an inheritance, lifetime gift, large bonus or redundancy lump sum. The receipt of what can be a life-changing sum of money can be challenging even for those who consider themselves to be relatively financially astute.

From understanding specific tax rules relating to your windfall, to deciding how to best invest the proceeds to meet your financial goals, dealing with a windfall requires careful planning and consideration, which can prove stressful without professional financial advice. You may wish to deposit your windfall into a separate savings account so that it can accrue interest until you decide what to do with it. Depending on your financial goals, you may wish to consider:

- Paying down debt or reducing your mortgage
- Using your tax-free allowances to pay into an ISA and/or pension
- Building up an investment portfolio
- Buying a property or investing in buy-to-let.

Depending on the source of your windfall, there may also be tax to pay on the money you receive.

Handling an inheritance

If a loved one passes away and leaves you an inheritance in their Will, dealing with your windfall at an already emotional time may feel overwhelming. This is where professional financial advice can really help. For example, there may be Inheritance Tax (IHT) payable on the money or assets you receive, depending on the size of your inheritance. IHT is currently payable at 40% on estates over the value of £325,000. The main residence nil rate band is currently £175,000 and applies when a residence is passed on death to a direct descendant, such as a child or grandchild. When added to the existing threshold of £325,000, this could potentially give rise to an overall allowance of £500,000 for those who are single or divorced, or £1m for those who are married or in civil partnerships. Larger estates will find that residence relief is tapered. It will reduce by £1 for every £2 of value for estates valued over £2m.

IHT will usually be paid from the funds of your loved one's estate before you receive it, so there normally won't be any further tax to pay on your windfall once you receive it. Although there are some circumstances where this isn't always the case, so it is best to consult a financial adviser to fully understand the tax due on your inheritance and the best way of funding any potential IHT bill which may arise.

If a loved one gifts assets while they are still alive, there will be no IHT to pay if they live for another seven years after gifting it to you. This is called lifetime gifting and is a common method of passing down assets tax-efficiently. However, it is best to put some money aside for a potential IHT bill in case your loved one were to pass away before the seven-year period has passed. IHT-free gifts can also be made, although these involve smaller sums – limits and conditions apply. It is advisable to place your inheritance money in a separate, easy-access and high-interest savings account while you take financial advice and decide what to do with it. The money will be protected

by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme (FSCS), which protects 'temporary high balances' up to the value of £1m for a period of six months.

Top tips for making the most of your windfall

When you receive some unexpected money, follow our top tips for capitalising on your newfound wealth:

1. DON'T SPEND IT STRAIGHT AWAY

Separate it from your regular income by placing it in a high-interest savings account. This will give you the time you need to consider your options.

2. TAKE FINANCIAL ADVICE

Even if you know what you want to do with your windfall, professional financial advice can help you put a plan in place that will minimise tax and ensure your money is working hard for you.

3. UNDERSTAND THE TAX IMPLICATIONS

We can explain the tax due on your windfall, and any strategies you can use to minimise it.

4. LIST YOUR SHORT, MEDIUM AND LONG-TERM FINANCIAL PRIORITIES

In the short-term, you might be looking to pay off debts or build an emergency fund. A medium-term goal might be helping a child onto the property ladder or overpaying on your mortgage. While long-term goals are likely to relate to building up your pension for a comfortable retirement, for instance, or even buying a second home abroad.

5. TREAT YOURSELF!

While the majority of your windfall should of course go towards improving your lifestyle and meeting your financial goals, you may want to use some of it for fun. 

Top Tips For Pain Free Gardening

Activity in the fresh air can make us feel healthy and happy. Gardening offers both physical and mental benefits. But... frequent bending, twisting, lifting, pulling and pushing may result in back pain.

Try our **top ten tips to avoid back pain** whilst enjoying your garden:



1. Warm your muscles and loosen your joints before starting.
2. Gradually build up your gardening time, starting with an hour or two.
3. Take small breaks every 10-20 minutes, stretching hourly.
4. Focus on time and not task.
5. Vary your tasks regularly, reducing the amount of time you spend using the same set of muscles - e.g. follow digging with mowing.
6. Dig in front of you using your foot to push the shovel into the soil. Lean into the spade from above, pushing down rather than out in front of you.
7. When raking, keep your back straight and pull the rake towards your body rather than to the side.
8. Try to swap your hands when using tools – avoiding overusing one side of the body.
9. Use a kneeling pad or cushion, and don't overreach.
10. Lift with your feet at least hip-width apart. Bend your knees, hinge yourself at your hips and keep your back straight.

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NHS Changes to Cervical Screening: Update

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Changes to cervical screening in England for those aged 25-49

Cervical screening is moving from 3 to 5 year intervals for those aged 24-49 who are at low risk of developing cervical cancer. Anyone who has had a recent history of an HPV positive test, or any changes to cells, may also be followed up more often – even if they are negative on their next test.

This decision is based on strong clinical evidence and recommended by the UK National Screening Committee, bringing England into line with Scotland, Wales and other countries across Europe.


If you've already been given a date for your next test, attend your appointment – the changes only apply to screening done or after July 1st 2025.

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
