Curious pets, particularly dogs, may investigate and eat gifts, including non-edible ones left under the tree, food in the kitchen or chew on plants decorating the house.

TOXIC FOODS

Contact your yet for advice if your pet has eaten any of these foods:

The following is more hazardous and can Cause significant gastrointestinal effects:



- Mistietoe (Viscum album)



Letters to the Editors

Dear Editors

It is now nearly a year since Mr Kevin Cadd and 300+ residents of Meppershall raised a petition on road safety concerns with Central Beds Council Traffic Department. At the traffic meeting on the 15th December the Chairman Councillor Delgardo who has ultimate responsibility for all road safety improvements stated the following: new vehicle speed measurements would be undertaken on Shefford Road and other approach roads to the village. He agreed that 40mph buffer zones should be installed ahead of the 30mph signage at entrances to the village this to ensure that vehicles were not leaving a 60mph zone to immediately enter a 30mph section.

All other actions required in the petition would await the findings of the vehicle speed measurements. To date the only actions I have seen are the painting of Dragon teeth and 30mph signage on Shillington Road. What happened to the other traffic calming measures on this road such as pedestrians on road warning signs (no footpath here) and the replacement of the VAS signage warning approaching vehicles of their speed? Is the excuse here the delay of having an S278 raised on the developer? What happened to the requests for 20mph signage on the High street and roads off, also Fildyke Road and the length of Shefford Road? Pedestrian crossing points (especially for children) seemed to have been ignored? Nothing done on Chapel Road 60mph, especially at the junction with Fildyke Road 30mph.

I am led to believe the Parish Council have been awarded £20k by the Beds PCC for traffic safety initiatives so let's hope Beds CC Traffic department will work with the Parish Council to ensure this money is put to good use within Meppershall. Perhaps our Ward Councillors Brown and Liddiard will help in this matter? One can only hope by the time the December issue of the Messenger is published Central Beds Council has at least completed some of the residents' concerns.

Highland Hike for MIND by Ben Jarvis

In August this year I took on the challenge of walking from Edinburgh to Inverness across 7 days in aid of MindUK. Across the 7 day period I traversed 134.4 miles, took over 233 thousand steps, and raised £805. But alongside the statistics and stories of the trip, I also went on a completely different type of journey. Prior to the trip I lived a life of distractions (both positive and negative) which never allowed me to think too deeply into things. Upon being alone with only my thoughts to keep me company, I began to delve deep into troublesome thoughts and without the aforementioned distractions, it was hard to pull myself away.

Throughout the trip, many difficult times arose. Tears, panic, and sleepless nights occurred. But for those I am thankful. It was these times that allowed me to take a step back from the chaotic normality we all usually dwell within and really think about what I have to



appreciate in life. Many things came to mind of course, some that I do not think about or let alone show my appreciation for enough.

Ever since returning, I feel as though I am more in touch with my mental health.

Within our society, mental health is seen as a taboo and a lot of us find it difficult to talk about. However, as with most things, the start is always the hardest. That being said, speaking out is the best decision I made. More than that, it is the only action I have taken so far that has provided me with a long-term coping mechanism and led me to meet some incredible people. A common misconception is that people no longer care about each other, but this strictly is not true. Since opening up and seeking help, I have felt more loved and accepted than ever. I now partake in regular meetings to talk with other people experiencing similar mental battles, a weekly group session where I am educated on how to live with anxiety and cope in heightened situations, as well as carrying out routine practices to maintain a healthy mindset and lifestyle.

The point of this message is not to just tell my story, but also to let it be known that you can talk about this, and there are people who will listen. I urge you, if you are suffering, please seek assistance because you do not have to suffer alone. The more that we talk individually, the more that society talks as a whole.


Thanks to you all





Meppershall Parish Council – Approved Minutes

An Ordinary Meeting of Meppershall Parish Council (MPC) took place on Monday 11th October.

Public Session - CBC Ward Councillor Mark Liddiard provided an update on Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) activities:

- Garden Waste Collections will take place from 18th to 30th October. During this time there will be no food waste collections.
- Tidy Tips Booking no longer required although some waiting time is evident at peak usage hours.
- Adults Carers Survey A survey will be sent to unpaid carers of adult social care customers in October 2021. CBC, as part of a National Survey, will be sending out the survey to a sample of around 800 carers, who look after a family member, partner or friend in need of support or services. The survey asks for views on whether services received by carers help them in their caring role, their life outside of caring and the Carers' perception of services provided to the cared for person. There are also questions to find out what effect the pandemic has had on them since March 2020. Any queries regarding the survey should be forwarded to insight@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk
- Free School Meals The Government has provided more money for Free School Meals and CBC / Schools will be providing eligible families with vouchers up to the February 2022 half term.
- CBC Parking fees and charges consultation is currently under way and residents are encouraged to respond.

Questions / comments from the public:

• The draft Neighbourhood Plan is a good piece of work, however it refers to two pubs in the village. The Airman is not situated in the centre of the village but on the A507 far away from village residents and refers to itself as a Hotel, Bar, Restaurant and Wedding Centre, not a pub. Members of the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group requested that the comments be submitted online so that they could be recorded with any others received.

Procedures, Consultations and Legal

i. Co-Option – One application for co-option received, however the applicant has not contacted either the Clerk or the Chairman regarding their application. They have been asked to do this prior to Council considering the application. Another email indicating interest has been received.

ii. Procedures

a. Creation of a Community Emergency Response Team CBC would like every parish to have a CERT WhatsApp Group to assist and provide information in times of need. There are 80 listed 'emergencies' when they could contact the CERT group from flooding to things like a gas or electricity outage, mains water burst lasting number of days, snow blocking roads, unexploded bomb etc. Council resolved to create a CERT WhatsApp Group and publicise. **b.** Council resolved to re-adopt MPC Meeting Recording and Filming policy v1.0

iii. Representation on Village Hall Committee

The Meppershall Village Hall 1960 conveyance and trust deed states that MPC (together with four other village organisations) shall appoint a representative member to the MVH Committee. The Committee is the Trustees and as such the MPC representative will become a Trustee. Councillors agreed that it is very difficult to act in the best interests of both organisations. However, a central focus of both roles is to act in the best interest of the village and its residents. If MPC is not represented on the committee then it cannot participate in decision making. The Clerk reminded councillors that any representative of MPC appointed to the MVH Committee must update their declarations of interests. *Council resolved to appoint Cllr Thompson as MPC Representative to MVH Committee*.

iv. Meeting invitations

Council resolved that the Clerk and Cllr Thompson attend the BATPC AGM and that Cllr Thompson attend the CBC Town and Parish Council Conference.

v. IT – Website and Email

Cllr Standbridge reported that the website and all emails have been moved to the new hosting supplier and that an application has been submitted and paid for the Meppershall-pc.gov.uk domain. There have been 517 total individual website users and the top page is the Neighbourhood Plan Regulation 14 consultation. The Chairman wished to repeat the councils thanks to Cllr Standbridge for the work required to change over hosting supplier.

vi. Centenary Field Parish Facilities

- a. The Chairman was pleased to report that the Settlement Agreement between MPC, MVHT and Croudace is acceptable to all parties and that the Settlement Agreement and Land Transfers involving MPC, MVHT, Polehanger Farms and Croudace can now be prepared for signing. Once signed the Clerk will initiate remedial works however the timing of those works will now need to be clarified with the contractor. Huge sincere thanks were expressed to the Clerk for the considerable amount of work put into getting all parties to reach an agreement and for the work ahead. Council resolved that the Clerk and Cllr Morgan engage with contractors to organise work required to Centenary Field and installation of gym equipment.
- **b.** The Clerk received an email from a reporter at the COMET newspaper, requesting a statement on the transfer of land to the Parish Council for a story to be published by them. After discussion with the Chairman it was agreed the Clerk should respond confirming that due to the nature of the request and the sensitivity of the situation, at present the Clerk was not personally able to provide any sort of statement or "words, quotes or extra background information" on behalf of the Parish Council "for a story". Council resolved that the Clerk prepare an announcement to the village on the handover to be issued via Facebook, website and Messenger.

vii. Stocken House Green Space

The Clerk and Cllr Thompson met to review an email from Davidsons regarding handover and to revise the draft Management Agreement provided by them. Councillors asked the Clerk and Cllr Thompson to agree the specification of the land at handover e.g. stone picking, seeding etc., and to check the CBC defects period on landscaping.

Council resolved that they appoint an Arborist to assist in monitoring works at Stocken House.

Finance

i. Budget Review

The Clerk provided Councillors with reports on budget versus year-to-date actual. No issues were identified although it was noted that some expenditure is higher than budgeted for but was approved at time of purchase.

ii. Reserves

The Clerk provided a breakdown of current Earmarked Reserves including details of any movement in or out in this financial year. Councillors were satisfied with current Earmarked Reserves.

iii. Orders for the payment of money - A schedule of payments was distributed at the meeting for approval and authorisation.

Planning and Housing

i. CB/21/04236/FULL - Vimyridge, SG17 5LN - Proposed garage conversion to habitable space.

No objections

- **ii. Ox-Cam Arc Spatial Framework Consultation** Councillors discussed the Ox-Cam Arc and the Clerk noted that Meppershall will be one of the villages within the Ox-Cam Arc. *Council resolved that the Clerk register MPC for receipt of correspondence from the Stop the Arc Group.*
- **Development Management Committee meeting on Wednesday 20th October** iii. in relation to CB/21/02885/FULL - The Pigling, Woodview Nurseries, SG17 5LL - Replace existing mobile home with a single storey two bedroom permanent **dwelling** - Councillors discussed their understanding of previous negotiations between the residents of The Pigling, CBC and MPC that dated back to 2008. It is the understanding of Ward Councillors and MPC, that CBC would take ownership of the site whilst a farm tenancy was in place. Once the farm tenancy was no longer in place the land would be transferred to MPC for the benefit of the village. Whilst councillors accept that every planning application is to be judged on its' own merits and material planning considerations, they also consider that a decision on the granting of planning permission for this site should be delayed until the current and future ownership of the site is confirmed. MPC currently consider themselves to be the future beneficial owner of the site and CBC will be required to list the mechanism of transfer to MPC. Council resolved that pending any legal update on the status of the Pigling, Cllr Crossley attend the DMC meeting and make MPC representation, and that the Clerk write to CBC Estates Team, CBC CEO, CBC Leader and CBC

Chair of DMC asking for a response to our previous correspondence requesting clarity of ownership of The Pigling and that consideration of the application at DMC is deferred.

Neighbourhood Plan - The Chair to the Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group reported that the consultation on the Draft Neighbourhood Plan (Regulation 14) has started and that 2 drop in sessions have been held at the Village Hall. There were only 4 visitors to the drop in sessions and currently only one submission has been received. Advertising of the Draft Plan consultation has taken place with banners erected in locations around the village, via Facebook (both via MPC and the Village Noticeboard), an email has been sent to previous subscribers and a leaflet will be distributed to all homes in the village with the Messenger. After the consultation ends on 31st October the Steering Group will need to consider the responses received, update the plan and then request its' examination by CBC.

Highways and Transport - The Clerk advised that the grant of £20k from the OPCC for highways improvements has been received into the MPC bank account and moved to Earmarked Reserves.

The Clerk was asked to write to the CBC Highways Officer requesting an update on traffic monitoring to assist in deciding on possible positioning of the VAS's as previously requested prior to the school summer holidays.

The Clerk reported that CBC had carried out a speed survey on Chapel Road. Results of the speed survey and assessment were issued in August 2021:

- The traffic count was conducted over a period of 7 days from 23 29 June 2021 and the location was selected as an appropriate position by an experienced Highways Engineer.
- The results indicate that the majority of vehicles are travelling well within the 60mph limit, with mean speeds of around 41-42mph and 85% of vehicles travelling at or below 48 mph, see summary results below:

- Two minor incidents have occurred at the A507 end of Chapel End over the past 3 years and a serious accident took place in the evening, close to Fildyke Road. These incidents are not considered to be related to the existing speed limits and signage.
- CBC have also looked at signage and road markings along the road and do not consider that further signage is required. There are warning markings and signs present on the bends in the road to the north of the waterworks cottages.

• CBC recommend that when walking along rural lanes, pedestrians should stay on the right-hand side of the road to see oncoming traffic and wear bright clothing to ensure maximum visibility.

CBC will not be progressing any further action with regards to speed limits or warning signs along Chapel Road at this time. A resident is disputing the location of the assessment equipment however CBC Highways have responded to say that the location of the automatic traffic count was assessed and selected by an experienced highways engineer and that adjustments to speed limits must be justified with fact-based information, including speed data and a documented collision history. Where there is neither a demonstrated speeding issue nor collision history, such locations are not progressed. CBC have confirmed that the traffic count results provided do not support the need for any further assessment and do not consider that a speed limit reduction is required for Chapel Road in Meppershall.

It was also noted that the footpath adjacent to the 15 Shillington Road development has been completed but the replacement VAS, village entrance sign and road markings have not been installed, the bell mouth entrance to the site is missing its final surface and street signage is still not compliant with CBC specifications. *The Clerk was asked to contact CBC enforcement again regarding the above matter.*

Environment and Leisure - Councillors discussed a request to consider the purchase of planters and flowers to be installed under village signage at village entrances from a resident who currently maintains the planter at the Shefford Road village entrance. Councillors believe that the village entrance signs are installed on highways land and therefore planters should not be placed under them. There is also a potential health and safety issue in maintenance and watering of planters.

Health and Safety - Councillors had previously received reports of the play areas inspections and noted that although there were no issues of high importance requiring action a quotation for remedial work suggested in the reports was to be obtained.

Staffing - Community and Environment Officer - The Clerk advised that an interview for the role was planned for tomorrow. Councillors agreed that if the Clerk and Cllr Merryweather were not happy with the candidate, the Clerk should arrange to readvertise the role. If the Clerk and Cllr Merryweather are happy with the candidate then the Clerk will call an extra-ordinary meeting to consider the appointment, terms and conditions, and all other relevant matters. As this meeting will require discussion on the suitability of the candidate and particulars of their employment it was suggested that members of the public and press be excluded.

CBC Wants Your Views on its Adult Carers Strategy

Central Bedfordshire Council has launched a public consultation on its new Adult Carers Strategy, which outlines how it will support unpaid carers who are caring for family, friends and neighbours living in Central Bedfordshire.

Did you know?

Estimates suggest
that there are around
30,000 unpaid carers
in Central
Bedfordshire - around
10 per cent of the
local population —
providing care for a



few hours a day, a few days a week or around the clock. This has increased due to the COVID-19 pandemic, with Carers UK reporting that 81% of carers across the UK are providing more care than before lockdown.

How CBC will support unpaid carers

The Council's new strategy Adult Carers Strategy contains four priorities the Council hopes to put in place over the next five years to ensure unpaid carers:

- are offered more appropriate information, advice and support, and are given opportunities to share their views and to help to shape local services
- have the opportunity to have a family and community life that includes things of interest to them alongside their caring role
- remain emotionally and physically well
- receive training to enable them to support their cared for person better

It was developed with input from Bedfordshire, Luton and Milton Keynes Clinical Commissioning Group (BLMK CCG), carers and voluntary and community organisations that deliver services and help represent the views of people they support.

Have your say

CBC is keen to hear from as many people as possible, but in particular they want to hear from people who provide care and whose lives are impacted by their caring responsibilities, and those who receive care.

The consultation document and the consultation questionnaire are available online at www.centralbedfordshire.gov.uk/consultations. The consultation is open until 3 March 2022.

What is a CERT?

A CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) is made up for organisations and volunteers willing to respond to a village emergency and to provide support. They are vital in increasing our resilience during emergency incidents such as fires, flooding, disease outbreak, major transport disruption or a loss of utilities.

How does a CERT help the community?

During an emergency, a village CERT may be called in to action by Central Bedfordshire Council to work alongside other emergency responders. As volunteers members are all local, they bring a level of expertise and local knowledge that the emergency services often rely on. We spend the vast majority of our time preparing for large scale emergencies that fortunately rarely occur, however it is often the small-scale emergencies that can have a negative impact on a community and cause disruption.

Who knows what's going to happen?

What would we do if our village water supply suddenly ceased together with the gas supply because a burst water main has ruptured a medium pressure gas main? Water should be restored within 2 days, but the gas supply could take up to 5 days. It's freezing and the forecast is -2 degrees at night over the next week. Snow is also predicted. Villagers need to be careful not to overload the electricity network as this could blow the sub-stations causing widespread power outages. Who will help our vulnerable residents and help the emergency services co-ordinate help for all? The residents of Lockerbie never imagined a 747 falling from the sky and landing in their village!

Update from Festus Akinbusoye, Police and Crime Commissioner



Since being elected, I have met with over 100 Town and Parish Councils online, attended four Parish Council meetings, and a Full Council meeting at each of our three local authorities.



In addition to my weekly visit to commissioned partners and organisations, I have held six Community Engagement meetings across the county so far and been on patrol duties with our officers.

At a recent Annual Parish Council meeting organised by my office, which was attended by Senior Leadership Team from Bedfordshire Police, I shared the following with councillors:

Community Policing Plan

As part of my Police and Crime Plan, priority number one is 'investment in community-based and community-led policing for rural and urban areas'.

Together, the Chief Constable Garry Forsyth and I are committed to focussing on 'proactive policing'. Residents have told me they want to see more of a visible, proactive, problem-solving police presence in our communities.

It is therefore my responsibility to hold the Chief Constable accountable for delivering on the people's policing priorities.

In response to this, we have agreed to increase the number of our Community Policing Team in Bedfordshire to:

- 67 Community Police Officers
- 51 PCSOs
- 14 Sergeants

The focus will be on the officers being visible, proactive, dedicated to their local areas.

I recognise there is still more to do in tackling speeding, drug dealing and anti-social behaviour. However, I need to ask your help in continuing to provide us with data and activity about crimes. This helps with the deployment of officers. To report a crime, you can do so by calling 101 or anonymously by contacting Crimestoppers.

We are also now recruiting for Community Special Constables. These are volunteer police officers who will be trained and deployed to carry out policing duties in their local area.

Early intervention and prevention

A big focus of mine is early intervention. One of my campaign pledges was to roll out 'Out of Court Disposal Orders' which allow officers to refer low risk, persistent offenders to local support services.

What this means is, we keep persistent offenders outside of the criminal justice system while referring them to support services to deal with issues such as drug and alcohol addiction as a condition of the order. Since launching this, I am pleased to say 100% of those referred so far have not re-offended since the scheme started.

This frees up police time, saves tax-payers money and reduces repeat victimisation of our residents.

I've also been spending lots of time at schools across the county and have weekly visits in my diary. I believe it is important for young people to have a positive understanding about policing and know that they have power to make positive choices.

Due to recent covid guidelines from Local Authorities, we have postponed our inaugural Bedfordshire-wide schools debating competition to early 2022. The competition is for 15–18-year-olds. This will create opportunities for developing confidence, critical thinking, and life skills.

Plans are also well under way for the Summer of Fun 2022 initiative which is part of investing in early intervention programmes to safeguard our young people, encourage healthy choices and improve self-esteem.

I am also investing money to tackle domestic abuse and sexual violence by focussing on perpetrators, while changing the narrative from advising victims on personal safety.

Force Control room

I am working with the Force to invest in the effectiveness of the Force Control Room.

They are the first point of contact along with the Community Policing team. We've recruited nine new members recently with almost 20 police officers providing expert support. By April 2022 we will be above our establishment level for the first time in several years.

I will be reviewing this towards the end of the financial year to see what more can be done to improve retention and quality of service to the public.

Speed Watch Volunteers

Our Speed Watch team is currently looking for more volunteers. Speed Watch is a fantastic, educational scheme aimed at raising awareness of speed restrictions and road safety. Those captured speeding receive a warning letter from Bedfordshire Police and persistent offenders' details are passed to our local policing team for further action. I remain optimistic about the future of Bedfordshire Police and our plans to cut crime, prevent harm, and protect victims. Our concerted effort on tackling crime as well as its root causes will pay off.

COVID Info: Have You Had the Jab?

It is easy to book a vaccine appointment online (www.nhs.uk) for an appointment at a vaccination centre or pharmacy or to find a walk-in COVID-19 vaccination site. You may also be contacted by your GP surgery to book an appointments with them. You can call 119 free of charge or use the NHS textphone service on 18001 119 or the NHS 119 BSL interpreter service. The following info is correct as of 29 November – but please check NHS information for the latest details.

Everyone from the age of 12 will now be able to get a 1st and 2nd dose of a vaccine.

Booster vaccines (a third dose) are being offered to those over 18 and are given at least three months after the second dose.

Getting the vaccine protects us individually and it protects the people around us. Wearing a mask also helps you as well as the people around you. Let's make it a COVID-secure Christmas and New Year, keeping our village life going by playing it safe.

What about getting a Covid-19 test?

Find information about using the simple rapid lateral flow self-test conveniently in your own home at https://www.gov.uk/order-coronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests or by calling 119. Many people with COVID-19 do not have symptoms. Rapid lateral flow tests help to find cases in people who may have no symptoms but are still infectious and can give the virus to others. The test usually involves taking a sample from your tonsils (or where they would have been) and from your nose, using a swab. You can get a result in 30 minutes. Please consider testing if you are going to be with other people, whether or not you have been vaccinated.

Behind the Scenes and Henlow Vets by Andrew Pain

Those of you who have had occasion to visit Henlow Vets recently will have noticed building works going on. And probably wondered what they were up to. Well, they've more or less finished now, and we were invited for a tour to see what has been done. The answer is – a lot.

Graeme Mason, who with veterinary surgeon business partner Dr Anna Marshall-Brown, started the practice in 2017, showed me round the other day, and the changes and improvements in the 4 years since are astonishing. From a start-up with just Anna, Graeme and 2 staff, there are now state-of-the-art facilities, including 4 consulting rooms, operating theatres/treatment rooms, laboratories and testing facilities, laser therapy, a specialised ultrasound/scanning area, an isolation unit, temperature-controlled dispensary, dedicated dental room/theatre, separate areas for cats and small animals away from dogs, a dedicated area for wildlife and RSPCA rescues – and 37 strong team!



It's a bit like the Tardis in there - incredible what they have built in this modest space.

Two of the new rooms, a lab and the dental theatre

They have also launched an in-house 24-hour emergency service, run by the many of the same team who see your pet normally, so he believes that the care they offer will be far better than the contracted-out facilities generally offered out of hours. The continuity of care is seamless, they have all your pets' records to hand and a dedicated care plan for each pet being kept in.



Graeme is rightly proud of the fact that Henlow Vets have been only marginally affected by the effects of Brexit and Covid. He told me how they adapted to remote working, team bubbles and carpark consulting. The practice is now a decent sized local employer "Almost all of our staff are local, and we have a lot of part-time working mums who are happy to work around school times etc. It suits them, and it works really well for us".

Amongst these staff are 9 vets, 11 qualified nurses, 4 veterinary care assistants (who free up the nurses for the specialised tasks, rather than admin and constant cleaning jobs), ensuring the best care possible. Henlow Vets is also a nurse training practice, providing keen youngsters with a career path.

Soon to come are a second ultrasound area, specialised clinics for cats and dogs as well as a "crash room" for staff on emergency duty overnight (complete with shower room). A particular innovation he told us about involves an intriguing use for leadingedge facial recognition software. Not for identifying Fido, but in the lab, to identify different crystal structures in urine samples! Weirdly, different conditions result in distinct crystal shapes, and this software delivers a faster and more accurate diagnosis there and then, rather than sending samples away and waiting for results. Who knew?



Dog minor ops and preparation

It was a fascinating insight into a well-equipped facility, offering great services and care to our pets, right on the doorstep. Graeme is also keen and willing to help out with injured wildlife, as some of you will have seen on the village Noticeboard recently. They will always try their hardest to keep any animal alive, and will never euthanise a healthy animal. Another benefit to living in Meppershall, given the wildlife all around us!

So a big thank you to Graeme Mason and the team at Henlow Vets for showing me round and explaining all the facilities they've managed to install. The Messenger wishes them all the best for what will be a very successful future.


10 Christmas Hazards All Pet Owners Should Be Aware Of

It's so tempting, isn't it – giving your beloved pet an extra-special Christmas treat! After all, it's a special time; it's only once a year, a little bit won't hurt them, he loves it, etc etc...

But Vets Now reported almost EIGHT TIMES the normal number of chocolate poisoning cases last Christmas and Boxing Day. Most owners know it's poisonous for pets, but animals can help themselves if we're not careful. And chocolate isn't the only hazard....

- **1 Chocolate.** Well, we knew that. Didn't we? Just don't...unless it's a specific pet chocolate. And don't leave them around the tree or dangling. Too tempting.
- **2 Mince pies and Christmas pud.** Raisins, sultanas and currants are all toxic to dogs. So no nibbling!
- **3 Blue cheese.** Contains Roquefortine C. Not at all good for dogs. Even too much cheddar can be harmful...but especially blue cheeses.
- **4 Tinsel.** Loads of fun to play with, perhaps, but can cause dangerous intestinal blockages when eaten. So be careful when playing.
- **5 Macadamia nuts.** Often used in biscuits, but toxic to dogs. Stick to dog treats.
- **6 Garlic, chives, onions.** Common in stuffing. All are poisonous to dogs. Keep it on the plate!
- **7 Snowglobes**. Ok, nobody's going to feed their cat a snowglobe. But they can get dropped and broken, and imported versions (and what ISN'T imported?) probably contain antifreeze, a spoonful of which can kill a cat...
- **8 Candles.** Look lovely on the hearth and table. But pets don't realise they can burn when nosed. Brushing up against them can singe fur. And if knocked over...? So be careful.
- **9 Fairy lights.** Cats in particular are curious, and have been known to chew on the wire, and this can have consequences. Be especially careful with higher voltage sets.
- **10 Alcohol.** Even a small amount (a spoonful) can cause liver and brain damage for cats and dogs.

We're sure that all our readers love their pets, and will do right by them at Christmas. Find out if your vet offers an emergency service over the holiday, just in case. And make sure every pet has a good Christmas. If they get hold of the carrot left out for Santa's reindeer you might be fine... but the mince pie and sherry could be a different story...!

Identifying Tension Issues

During stressful periods, a lot of us hold tension in our shoulders. Beyond the obvious pain and tenderness, other problems can arise from this.

Neck Pain and Headaches

The muscles on the tops of your shoulders attach to the neck. Tension here can quickly lead to tighter muscles in the neck itself.

Some headaches are caused by problems in the neck. Tight neck muscles can also cause tooth clenching and jaw problems. Prolonged desk work can multiply the problem if it encourages craning the neck forward. This stretches the front of the neck, pulling the jaw open. Our bodies subconsciously make the effort to keep the jaw closed, so the muscles tense up around the joint.

Your osteopath works to release the muscles in question, but also to get to the root cause. This may involve changes to your desk set-up.

Breathing Problems

The role of some of those tight shoulder muscles is to assist with breathing. This may be why stress caused them to tense up in the first place. Good, efficient breathing is led by the diaphragm. When the diaphragm is tight or limited, the shoulder muscles work harder. However they become fatigued more easily than the diaphragm and may ultimately even restrict the movement of the upper ribs.

Diaphragm dysfunction can also play a role in acid reflux.



THE ROUTE

This time round I decided to catch the W12 service from Meppershall to Hitchin.

THE JOURNEY

I jumped on the bus at the bus stop outside the Sugar Loaf pub on the High Street in Meppershall, which arrived promptly at 9.18am, as always, I headed for the row of seats at the back of the bus. Today's volunteer bus driver was Graham, and on all accounts, he gets amazing reviews from his regular passengers.

to the Market Square to get a coffee. I discovered a really good bakery called 'Quotidian' at the end Sun Street, here I bought the most amazing sausage roll,


truly delicious, I even went back into the shop to thank the baker.
