Editorial By James Read

It's a history-making month and there's lots to read here in your village magazine. Whatever you make of our royal family and the concept of monarchy, the Coronation makes this a remarkable time in our history.



The first King of England emerged in Anglo-Saxon times, at a time when the nation we call home was first named and ruled. King Egbert was not actually called "King" when he took the throne in 829AD. He was the "Bretwalda of Britain" — an overlord granted power over the multiple Anglo-Saxon territories that stretched across our island in a patchwork led by competing, rival regional chiefs. His Majesty King Charles III will be number 62 in that line of succession on the English throne.

By chance, the Coronation falls a few days after the anniversary of the Act of Union (1st May 1707) which created the single nation we call Great Britain by combining England, Wales and Scotland. His Majesty will be the 12th Monarch to rule that nation.

But it was 1922 when the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland came into being, making Charles only the 5th Monarch to rule, by that definition, the nation which we live in today.

I believe almost all of us will be looking forward to 6th May 2023 with excitement and pride. While governments come and go, and even national boundaries change, Charles III is the successor in an institution that traces its history back over almost 1,200 years. Almost 200,000 UK armed forces personnel swear allegiance to him and people across the country draw pleasure, inspiration and confidence from the presence of the Royal Family in public life. And we'll all take the chance for a bit of a party!

No Monarch before him has come to the throne at a greater age — a great contrast with his mother who became Queen as such a young woman. His heirs are, today, defined only by family relationship — not by whether they are male or female, as was the case in the past. And, for the first time, the many faiths that comprise our great nation will play a formal role in the ceremony of the Coronation in Westminster Abbey. Long may this greater diversity and inclusion, in the activities and expressions of our Monarchy, continue and grow.

Meppershall's bells will ring out from the church tower at 10.30am on Monday 8th May in celebration of the Coronation – do listen out! Our ringers have grown in number, with training sessions taking place since last year, to make sure we have enough to Ring For The King (which is only right – our church is almost as old as the Monarchy!)



That was over FIVE years ago now. If I had not attended that routine mammogram I do not know if I would be here today.

Please, please, do go for your breast screening - its free and could save your life!

Dear Editor

This letter was dated 24th March – just too late for the April issue.

I recently had a visit from Mr Kevin Cadd, a resident of Meppershall, who advised me of the following and asked if I could find out what was going on. It would appear some of the hedgerow , trees and bushes had been removed from the edge of Shefford Road. This was just past the retirement home on the left hand side travelling towards Shefford.

I immediately looked at the Central Beds (CBC) planning pages to see if any recent applications had been made regarding this site. There were none. I then contacted my colleague Alex, Meppershall Parish Council Clerk, who forwarded me the following information:

'We have been aware of work to clear the copse in this area since last week. There is nothing we can do to stop them as the area has no protection under TPOs (Tree Preservation Orders). If they are burning on site and this is causing a nuisance then residents can contact CBC (Central Bedfordshire Council) or if the smoke is drifting onto the road and is a road health and safety issue then contact the Police. 'I believe the fire service and police were on site last week.

'If the land owner is hoping to submit a planning application for this site then it is yet to be submitted and I cannot find any details of pre-planning advice online. This site is definitely outside of our village envelope and is not an allocated site under the Local Plan. As CBC have a robust 5+ year housing supply then this windfall site would not be required. They may have spent lots of money for nothing.

'If the hedges have been removed then this may not be permitted – see below:

'The Hedgerow Regulations 1997 are designed to give protection to important hedgerows in England and Wales. Anyone proposing to remove a hedgerow, or part

of a hedgerow, which is covered by the regulations, must first notify the Local Planning Authority by submitting a Hedgerow Removal Notice. For the purposes of the regulations, remove is defined as uprooting or otherwise destroying a hedgerow. The Regulations apply to any hedgerow which:

- 'Grows in, or adjacent to any common land, Local Nature Reserve, Site of Special Scientific Interest, or land used for agriculture, forestry of the breeding or keeping of horses, ponies of donkeys and;
- 'Has a continuous length of at least 20 metres, or if less than 20 metres, meets another hedgerow at each end;
- 'In calculating the total length of a hedgerow, any gap resulting from a contravention of these regulations and any gap not exceeding 20 metres should be treated as part of the hedgerow. A hedgerow, which meets another hedgerow, is to be treated as ending at the point of intersection or junction.
- 'The regulations do not apply to any hedgerow within the curtilage of, or marking a boundary of the curtilage of a dwelling house.'

If someone can get me or Meppershall Parish Clerk photos of the site as it is today without hedges then I can send these through to CBC for them to investigate.

Meppershall Parish Council Summary of Minutes 13th March 2023

Chairman's announcements

- The crime statistic for Meppershall show 3 reported crimes for last month.
- A grant request for assistance with coronation celebration funding from the Meppershall Social Club is pending.
- The clerk is dealing with damage by UKPN to Old Road Meadow subsequent to installation of a new electricity pole for the homes being built on the former site of the Mow.
- The Defibrillator Seminar went well with 25+ attendees. Thanks was given to the Clerk and Mrs Sharon Tingey for giving up their time to help with refreshments. As a consequence of the seminar the Clerk has been asked to:
 - Look into the provision of a 'bleed kit' for the village.
 - Discuss with Councillor Parsons the procedure for checking the status of village defibrillators and to instruct Councillor Addy how to do this as a backup.

Public Session - CBC Ward Councillors Liddiard and Brown provided an update on Central Bedfordshire Council (CBC) activities:

- Brookmead and Brookside footpaths Communication with the Highways Asset Team regarding resurfacing or patching continues. Ward Councillors have met with residents on site and are working with CBC Officers to see if work in these areas will be included in plans for 2023-2024.
- Shefford Road resurfacing Councillor Liddiard has requested that CBC Highways consider the resurfacing of Shefford Road from Hoo Road up to 32 Shefford Road and that these works be added to a prioritisation plan.
- Mr Scott Terry, CBC Principal Highways Officer will be coming to the village next week
 to view potholes and the general state of the roads. It is recognised that pot holes
 have become worse over the last week due to weather conditions and their repair is
 a key priority for CBC.
- 100 High Street and removal of trees on site No trees on this site (or on land near the Care Home) are protected by Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs), therefore CBC does not have jurisdiction to interfere with their removal. Hedgerows, however, are protected.
- CBC Officer Recruitment CBC are experiencing challenges with the recruitment of Highways and Planning Officers. They are managing with agency staff at present. A recruitment strategy has been requested.
- Hoo Road Signage Current CBC Officers are leaving / have left CBC; however this will be requested when a new officer is in post.

Questions / comments from the public

• The state of Brookmead due to construction work and traffic is not good at the moment, can anything be done about this as it only gets cleaned once a week? *Unfortunately not much can be done.*

Procedures, Consultations and Legal

- a. Procedures Resolved to approve MPC Schedule of Delegation v1.0. Carried.
- **b.** Health & Safety and Risk Management Resolved to approve the 2022-2023 Risk Review and Actions and that they be signed by the Chairman. Resolved to approve the MPC Litter Pick Risk Assessment.
- **c. Annual Parish Meeting** Cllrs agreed to facilitate and hold the Annual Parish Meeting on 24th April, starting at 7:00pm in the Village Hall as per the approved meeting schedule and that the Clerk publicise the meeting as usual.

- d. Beds Police Priority Setting The Clerk and Councillor Parsons attended a meeting of all Area 5 parishes on 7th March who agreed that the priority will be antisocial behaviour (ASB) with visible police presence. A follow up meeting is planned for 20th June 2023. A meeting is also planned on 16th May where Clerks and Chairs will be encouraged to share resources and work together on a number of projects. Both meetings will be held at the Shefford Town Council offices.
- **e. IT and Communications** A report on website usage was circulated to councillors at the beginning of the month. The MPC allotment logo has been changed as requested by councillors so that wording reads as Meppershall Parish Council Allotments. Minor amendments have been made to the MPC website.
- **f. Stocken House Green Space** The Clerk has not received any update on the adoption agreement. *Clerk has chased for an update but nothing received yet.*
- **g.** MPC Crackle Hill Track / Driveway To consider action required subsequent to Anglian Water installing water meters and attempting to pass utilities across MPC land without permission. The Clerk and Councillor Thompson met with Anglian Water and their contractor on 13th March. Anglian Water are to confirm in writing the following:
 - Current stop cock and meters installed on MPC land to be removed and rerouted.
 - Water line for fire hydrant to be installed in location not on MPC land.
 - Anglian Water to reinstate / tarmac area of MPC driveway up to roadside.
 - Grass re-seeding to take place.

The MPC track / driveway will need to be closed for the works to be completed that will also require digging into the road. The Clerk advised that the driveway could be closed with appropriate warning and signage in place. Resolved that the Clerk continue to liaise with Anglian Water for the removal of their assets from MPC land and that if required a notice confirming closure of the permissive path (Crackle Hill Track / Driveway) is issued.

Finance

a. Purchase orders

Cllr Thompson did not participate in agenda items 811.a.ii having previously declared an interest. Cllr Chapman took over as Chairman of the meeting for this agenda item.

- i. Resolved to purchase litter pick equipment (pickers, hoops and bags) and refreshments for litter pick volunteers (Open Spaces Act 1906, s.10).
- ii. Resolved to purchase and donate tables at cost of £905.20+ VAT for use during meetings to Meppershall Village Hall (Local Government Act 1972, s.133).
- iii. Councillors to contact the Clerk if they wish to attend any BATPC Breakthrough Communications training.
- iv. Resolved to purchase replacement defibrillator battery, stationery and fencing in cemetery (Public health Act 1936, s.234 / Local Government Act 1972, s.111 / Open Spaces Act 1906, s.10).
- **b. Document approval** Resolved to approve Bank Statements & Reconciliations Current Account 170 and 171, Bank Statements and Reconciliations Savings Account 040 and MultiPay Card Statements and Reconciliations February 2023.
- c. Orders for the payment of money Resolved that the schedule of payments as presented be approved and authorised for payment by Councillor Thompson and or Councillor Parsons. Resolved to delegate authority to the Clerk for the payment of any products or services where an invoice is received prior to 31st March 2023.

Planning and Housing

a. Planning applications

- i. CB/23/00556/LB & CB/23/00555/FULL The Hollies, 2 Shillington Road, SG17 5ND Listed Building: Erection of part single and part two-storey rear extension and internal alterations. Resolved that the Council has no objection to planning application 23/00556 & 23/00555.
- ii. CB/23/00469/FULL 48 Orchard Close, SG17 5LW Single storey front extension and infill of existing open porch. *Resolved that the Council has no objection to planning application 23/00469.*
- iii. CB/TCA/23/00071 The Old Coach House, 10-12 Rectory Road, SG17 5NB Works to trees within a Conservation Area: remove Silver Birch Tree. Resolved that the Council objects to tree planning application 23/00071 as no reason is given in the application as to why the tree in a conservation areas need to be removed.

b. Appeals

i. APP/P0240/W/22/3307451 - CB/22/00799/FULL - The Pigling, SG17 5LL - Erection of two detached dwellings with associated garages and carport. – Amendments. *Resolved that the Council continues to object to application 22/00799.*

Neighbourhood Plan

- **a. Report** The Clerk has discussed with the Neighbourhood Plan consultant next steps and is progressing these.
- **b.** Neighbourhood Plan submission to CBC for External Review and Regulation 16 referendum. Resolved to approve the amended draft Neighbourhood Plan for submission to CBC for external Review and Regulation 16 referendum.

Highways and Transport

- a. OPCC and RMF grant funding update The Clerk advised that no further work has been completed the gateway was installed in January. Installation of the VAS is still pending.
 - The Clerk was asked to continue to chase Highways on the installation of the VAS again.
- **b. Update on road safety improvements on new developments** Councillor Seaman is awaiting an update from Davidsons; have responded; but approval from CBC for this initiative has been requested, to move forward.

Environment and Leisure

- **a. Allotments update** The Clerk advised that new plot holders continue to come forward.
- b. Update on Dog Fouling campaign The MPC dog fouling social media campaign is due to finish in April but continues to receive positive feedback. Unfortunately Mrs Thorne collected 5 bags full of dog mess from Old Road Meadow, councillors were extremely disappointed in uncaring dog owners for this. The Clerk was asked to organise signage stating that dogs should be on leads in MPC open spaces. They will review the situation later in the year and if dog fouling does not improve, they will consider not permitting dogs in MPC owned open spaces. The Clerk was asked to make a Freedom of Information request to CBC regarding the number and location of fines given for dog fouling in the area. The Clerk and Councillor Standbridge were also asked to come up with a social media campaign aimed at nuisance dog barking.
- **c.** Grass Cutting Resolved to approve the appointment of A & B Gardening Ltd as MPC 2023-2024 grass contractors.

Message from St Mary's...

First of all, you may have noticed that the work on the Church has begun! The work will continue through the summer and we hope be completed by mid-November by which time we will have new roofs to the tower and transepts and we will at last be able to remove the Harris fencing from around the church! My thanks to all whose generosity has enabled this - and especially to Chris Valentine, our Churchwarden, for working so hard with our architect to make it happen!

With the Coronation of His Majesty King Charles III, this year May will truly be an historic month. At 74, King Charles is the oldest Monarch ever to have been crowned. The 11am Sunday service on the 7th May will celebrate the Coronation, and the Church Bells will also ring in celebration on Monday 8th in the morning from 10.30am.

In his first speech, referring to his late Mother, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and her pledge to the people of all Commonwealth countries in 1947 that "my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service" King Charles added "That promise of lifelong service I renew to you all today."







NHS National Cancer Screening

The NHS cancer screening programmes can help to diagnose cancer or risk of cancer earlier and improve the likelihood of successful treatment. There are three national cancer screening programmes in England.

Cervical (25-64 years of age)
Breast (50-71 years of age)
Bowel (60-74 years of age)

If you are eligible, please make every effort to have your screening test. Screening can detect a problem early before you have any symptoms. Finding out about a problem early can mean that treatment is more effective.



1. Cervical screening

The NHS cervical screening programme in England is offered to people with a cervix aged from 25 to 64. Routine screening is offered every three years up to 49 years of age and every five years from 50 to 64 years of age. Depending on the result of the screen, people may be recalled earlier than these routine intervals.

As part of the NHS Cervical Screening Programme, all samples taken at cervical screening appointments are now being tested for high-risk Human Papillomavirus (HPV) in the first instance. This is the virus which causes nearly all cervical cancers. Samples that test positive for HPV will then go on to be further analysed to detect cell abnormalities.

HPV is a very common virus which effects around 8 in 10 people; it is nothing to be embarrassed about, and in many cases, your immune system will naturally get rid of HPV.

2. Breast screening

About 1 in 8 women in the UK are diagnosed with breast cancer during their lifetime. If it's detected early, treatment is more successful and there's a good chance of recovery. Breast screening uses an X-ray test called a mammogram that can spot cancers when they're too small to see or feel.

Breast screening is currently offered to women aged 50 to their 71st birthday in England. You may be eligible for breast screening before the age of 50 if you have a very high risk of developing breast cancer.

If you are 71 or over, you will stop receiving screening invitations. You can still have screening once you are 71 or over if you want to and can arrange an appointment by contacting your local screening service on 01582 497 599. If you're worried about breast cancer symptoms such as a lump or an area of thickened tissue in a breast, or you notice that your breasts look or feel different from what's normal for you, do not wait to be offered screening. 3. Bowel screening

Bowel cancer survival is improving in the UK and if diagnosed early, more than 90% of bowel cancer cases can be treated successfully. Screening programmes test to see if people show any early signs of cancer. By detecting bowel cancer at an early stage, treatment has a better chance of working.

As part of the NHS Bowel Cancer Screening Programme, men and women aged 60-74 are sent a home testing kit (Faecal Immunochemical Test or FIT) every two years to collect a small sample of poo to be checked for tiny amounts of blood which could be caused by cancer.

Would you like to exercise but don't have the time?

A new study has found that **11 minutes** of moderate exercise a day is enough to reduce the risk of early death. Findings show that: "Accumulating 75 min per week of moderate-intensity activity brought with it a 23% lower risk of early death."

Moderate exercise includes activities such as:

- Brisk walking
- Water aerobics
- Riding a bike light effort
- Dancing

- Washing windows/mopping floors
- Pushing a lawn mower
- Badminton
- Doubles tennis
- Gardening

The recommended amount of exercise a week is 150 minutes (about 22 mins per day) but even 75 minutes has a huge impact. That's just 11 minutes each day!

The study said: "If everyone managed at least 75 min per week of moderate-intensity physical activity, around 1 in 10 (10%) premature deaths, 1 in 20 (5%) cases of cardiovascular disease, and nearly 1 in 30 (3%) cases of cancer, would be prevented."



We at Shefford Community Fire Station hope you are all well and have been coping with the cold and wet weather conditions we have recently been experiencing. Fire calls have been picking up following a rather unusually quiet Jan and Feb.

Incidents of note
Building Fire - A507 Beadlow

At approx. 4am, Shefford was first in attendance at a well-developed, fully involved building fire. Crew Commander Tracy Hutchinson was the 1st officer in attendance, made pumps 3 and requested the Aerial Platform from Luton Fire Station. The Fire was soon brought under control and fully extinguished late that night.

Dog Rescues - Arlesey / Stotfold

We have been mobilised to a few dog rescues during the cold weather, where dogs were trapped in an icy river or lake. Crew Commander Ant Mason was officer in charge on both occasions, committing crews to the water in full water safe PPE to effect rescues. We are happy to report on both occasions the dogs were reunited with their owners safely.

Live Exercise

Shefford Station ran a live exercise at Schlegel International in Henlow. We simulated a Persons reported Chemical leak within the building. We were joined by Biggleswade, Sandy and Stopsley Fire Stations, as well as having the staff from Schlegel join in to try and make it as realistic as possible. Until the next time, stay safe.

Estate planning: Do you need to include Inheritance Tax?

Inheritance Tax (IHT) can affect what you leave behind for loved ones. It's essential you understand if it's something you need to think about, as there could be steps you can take to reduce a potential bill.

Over the last few months, you've read about what estate planning is and how to calculate the value of your estate. Mitigating an IHT bill should be an important part of your estate plan if you could be liable for it. Read on to find out when IHT is due.

The standard rate of Inheritance Tax is 40%

With a standard rate of 40%, IHT could substantially reduce the value of what you leave behind for loved ones. According to HMRC">HMRC, around 3.76% of estates pay IHT.

IHT is a tax on your estate after you pass away if the total value exceeds certain thresholds. There are two allowances that you could use:

If the value of your estate is below the **nil-rate band**, your estate will not be liable for IHT. For the 2023/24 tax year, it is £325,000. Should you leave your main home to your children or grandchildren, you may also be able to use the **residence nil-rate band**. For the 2023/24 tax year, it is £175,000. As a result, you could leave up to £500,000 before IHT is due.

You can also pass on unused allowances to your spouse or civil partner. So, if you plan as a couple, you could leave an estate valued at up to £1 million before it's liable for IHT. The portion of your estate that exceeds these allowances is usually taxed at 40%. Let's say you leave behind assets worth £600,000 to your child, including your main home to take advantage of the residence nil-rate band. The first £500,000 can be passed on without being liable for tax. However, there would be a tax charge of £40,000 on the £100,000 that exceeds the allowances.

You should note both the nil-rate and the residence nil-rate band are frozen at the current level until April 2028. While the value of your estate is below the threshold now, will this still be the case in five years? To plan effectively, you should consider how the value of your estate could change.

A plan is essential if you want to mitigate Inheritance Tax

There are often steps you can take to reduce a potential IHT bill. Creating a plan now could mean your loved ones inherit more of your estate.

There are lots of steps you can take to reduce IHT during your lifetime, including:

- Gift assets during your lifetime. You could support your loved ones by gifting
 assets now or during your lifetime. However, keep in mind that only some gifts
 will be outside of your estate for IHT purposes immediately. Others may still be
 included when calculating IHT for up to seven years. Contact us to discuss how
 to gift to reduce IHT liability now.
- Place assets in a trust. Placing assets in a trust could mean they are outside of your estate and, in some cases, you may still be able to benefit from the assets. You will need to name a trustee that will manage the assets on behalf of your beneficiaries. Trusts can be complex, especially if you need to consider IHT, so professional advice can be useful.
- Leave some of your assets to charity. This could bring the value of your estate below the IHT threshold. If you leave more than 10% of your entire estate to charity the IHT rate will fall from 40% to 36%, which could lower the bill for some families.
- **Keep the value of your estate below the IHT threshold by spending.** Make the most of your later years by spending more it could mitigate an IHT bill if it brings the value of your estate below the threshold for paying IHT.

As this month is King Charles' Coronation I thought I cannot pass up the opportunity to discuss our Kings love of Horticulture. King Charles III, the Gardener King!

Not only is he a keen gardener, he was ahead of his time when it came to organic gardening. With the Duchy Estate produce and wildlife friendly gardens at Highgrove. He created meadows of wildflowers here to encourage wildlife.

He of course has now inherited many spectacular gardens to enjoy. All having their own merits.

Charles is our most green fingered monarch to date and he has big plans for redesigning part of the Sandringham gardens.

The King wants to bring back a Topiary Garden with a biodiverse wildlife friendly feel which is also to feature drought tolerant planting due to our changing climate.

Sandringham garden has been much loved by many royals over the years all placing their own stamp on it.

Queen Mary had a summer house built. A magical hideaway, affectionately known as 'The Nest' in which she would spend many an hour. You meander up a small path to this whimsical grotto with the tranquil sound of water below. The Queen would have her afternoon tea up there away from the demands of Royal life.

Sandringham also boasted the most extravagant walled garden of it's time, 17 acres in size with the most grand of gates. Far larger than necessary and out of scale to the garden. King George VI mark on Sandringham.

with Roses, Lavender and Salvias.

These have green foliage and lime green small delicate frilly flowers. When water hits the leaves the tiny droplets sit on them like pearls.

Trugs and Trowels Gardening Club (Campton)

Spring is well under way and is very evident by the additional 30 new lambs here in Campton. Our trip out to Ashridge to enjoy the ancient bluebell woodland trails, and Ashridge House gardens, was enjoyed by the group and is now behind us and we look forward to a welcome from Michael Parrish at Shefford Hardwick farm at 4pm, 22nd April, when he will talk to us about the diversity of Bedfordshire farming. This is open to all, and a real insight into rural flexibility.

As you can see by our calendar, we have some changes to dates and locations ahead, so please add these adjustments to your diaries - thank you!

Ask yourself what your ideal garden would be, and in today's fast-living environment you're probably wanting 'low-maintenance' or even 'no-maintenance.' Does this garden exist?... No, but low-maintenance is achievable - it's largely down to the right choices — for instance, in your ratio of paving to lawn to borders, beds and planting. Firstly, look around and see what grows well in your area. A plant in the wrong place will always need attention, whilst evergreens or unusual leaf structures create all-year-round interest. This option doesn't always offer interesting flowers/blossom. Watering can be high maintenance, along with weeding and dead heading. A balance between practical solutions and aesthetic interests along with personal preference is needed. No digging allows mycorrhizal network of fungi to spread which extends to the root system of plants which in turn require less fertilisation and water (great for the environment). As soil develops, improves its drainage and accommodates more carbon, you can add mulch early winter. Plants thrive and establish quickly. Add more plants to fill spaces — this prevents weeds growing (nature fills a void).

Low maintenance lawns...? Artificial grass has become very popular as the lawn is said to be the most intensive maintenance requirement of any garden feature. Well contrary to belief, a fake lawn is not maintenance free. Weed seeds will eventually take hold and weeding an unnatural lawn is not easy. Washing is required on occasion especially if pets share your garden. Artificial grass is an emotive topic with a lack of scientific knowledge to assess the environmental impact of such a new product. When professionals install it, no doubt cuts down on maintenance, although the lack of biodiversity on fake lawn is an obvious drawback, whilst some view it as another component to the garden structure - like a patio.

As spring is finally here it is time to start mowing your lawns. If you haven't done it already, don't cut it too short the first time. The ideal height for the first cut of the season is 2.5cm to 4cm. If it gets a lot of wear and tear, then 5cm. Frequent mowing

maintains lawn quality. Remove all clippings (or for an organic approach leave some for the earthworms).

Are you full of Beans? In the veg patch they are known as legumes and are grown not only for their delicious crop but also for the nitrogen they restore to the soil. Runner beans and French beans can now be sown in pots indoors — they are sensitive to frost when a healthy young plant is planted out. Meanwhile you can improve the soil where they are going to grow by adding plenty of organic matter. Plant out early summer against supports 15cm apart. Weed regularly, watch for slugs and snails, and when they reach the top pinch out the growing tip. 'Cosse violet' is a very good French bean variety, with purple flowers. White Lady and Scarlet Emperor are reliable runner beans. On wet days, tend to your house plants, wipe leaves with water and lemon juice for shine and repot - adding slow release fertiliser. Wages of Fear

The film I'd like to open with is one I only recently rewatched, it's called "The Wages of Fear" (1953) and was directed by Henri-Georges Clouzot. The British Film Institute Blu-ray transfer I watched is just excellent and totally belies the age of the film. As this is a French production you won't be surprised to learn that most of the dialogue is in French, especially that between the four main characters. However, there are some scenes that are entirely in English, and some Spanish and German dialogue also makes an appearance. Thank the Lord for sub-titles for us monoglots.

This is the first film adaptation of Georges Arnaud's 1950 novel "Le Salaire de la Peur". The second adaptation is the William Friedkin directed "Sorcerer" (1977). Both are excellent nail-biting thrillers, but I think "Wages of Fear" is the best of the two, it's definitely the tensest. I remember watching this for the first-time on TV many years ago, and some of the scenes stayed vividly in my memory even though, until I watched it again, I couldn't remember which film they came from. For example, the tobacco blowing off an unrolled cigarette paper seconds before the sight and then sound of a massive explosion going off in the distance.

The story itself is set in an unnamed Central American country where a ramshackle group of lost and desperate fugitive men eke out a hand to mouth existence in a squalid township. None of them can ever hope to earn the \$1000 necessary to secure false papers and an air ticket to civilisation. The only employer is an American oil company that has little or no regard for the health and safety of its locally hired employees. One day one of the oil rigs suffers a catastrophic gas explosion. It is determined that the only way to extinguish the ensuing out-of-control conflagration is by means of a carefully orchestrated explosion that will snuff out the flames, just like blowing out a candle. To achieve this a large supply of nitro-glycerine is needed and this can only be delivered by driving it many miles up an unmaintained dirt road to the remote location. The company puts out a request for volunteers to undertake the trip and eventually selects four men to deliver the nitro in two trucks (one being sent as a backup just in case of 'accidents'). Each man is promised \$2000 when the job is completed.

Yves Montand plays Mario who has been trapped in this backwater for a very long time. His tedious existence is interrupted by the sudden arrival of Jo (Charles Vanel), an older man whose apparent toughness and machismo impresses Mario and causes him to ignore his usual roommate and companion Luigi (Folco Lulli). All put their names forward as candidates to undertake the mission and after a driving assessment Mario and another man are chosen to drive one truck, and Mario's ex-roommate Luigi and a Dutchman called Bimba (Peter van Eyck) the other. Jo is desperately disappointed not to have been chosen, but when the allotted departure time arrives Mario's co-driver is nowhere to be seen, but 'coincidentally' Jo just happens to turn up in time to replace him. The two trucks are loaded up with their dangerous cargo and depart in the dead of night 30 minutes apart for safety. Things then start to get very edge-of-the-seat indeed and continue that way right to the end, with several hazards and obstacles having to be overcome enroute to the site of the fire.

This is a film about desperation, courage, self-sacrifice, and companionship in the face of incredible risk. It's a tense, suspenseful, superbly made film that despite being 70 years old beats the majority of modern thrillers hands down. I think it's also a film that deserves a couple of minutes of quiet contemplation after it's ended, just so you can fully absorb what you just saw.
