Editorial by James Read

We welcome new enterprises to village this month — along with new friends and neighbours coming to live at Woodlands Rest. You'll see info about Meppershall Munchkins on p5 — a new baby and toddler group and an



important addition to the community. We wish Melanie and team every success. We are also welcoming The Butterfly Café to the village hall (p4) – a new venture aiming to keep us well supplied with tea and cake (and more besides!) in a local spot for meetups and chat. We look forward to seeing 'The Butterfly' really fly!

Speaking of which, you'll also find a hugely expressive and inspiring account of what it is like to soar into the skies as the pilot of a light aircraft – thanks to local pilot Martin Blandy for some great photos and a wonderful account on p24.

It is great to have some new ideas for things to watch and quality film reviews from Dave Peters (p26) – continuing this month with Scarlett Johansen playing the role of a predatory alien undergoing something of an awakening.

Those who have purchased parts of the village as prospective developers were likely disappointed with the outcome of the planning appeal regarding 100 High Street. This was their last attempt to get someone to say "yes" when Meppershall Parish Council, Central Bedfordshire Council and many others had repeatedly said "no." The appeal was refused, the proposal is not permitted, and it is good to note the reasons.

The Planning Inspectorate ultimately acknowledged that, in our locality, new houses are being supplied at more than the rate required, on a 5-year basis. Many of us have children. We want them to have houses in the future. We are not against new homes. But they must be the right number, of the right kind, in the right place.

So, considering the 100 High Street site, they recognised the "smaller fields and paddocks contained by the tree line on the ridge that acts as a buffer between the built-up area and the expansive countryside to the west." They noted this is now different in the south of the village compared to the north, where Woodlands Rest and Walnut Tree Way have sadly lost that "buffer". They said the 100 High Street development "would severely erode the rural setting which characterises this part of High Street" and concluded that a number of planning policies (HQ1, HQ8, EE5 and SP7) would be contravened. The entrance way would "detract from the rural village character of the area" and "the unoccupied and increasingly natural site would be replaced by an urban, estate type development."

We can be grateful for this outcome and the support of Councillor Blake Stephenson. No doubt another planning proposal will follow. We can only hope it will be a more beautiful and fitting proposal for a handful of appropriate houses that improve the village environment.

Rest in peace, Mike France – who for so many years presided over the beautiful garden at 100 High Street. Mike passed away on 18 August 2023. That was the very day that the formal planning decision was issued.




- Bury Farm and its surrounding were very different

Meppershall Parish Council – Approved Minutes

Approved Minutes of an Ordinary Meeting of Meppershall Parish Council (MPC) on Monday 24th July 2023.

Election of Chairman / Vice-Chairman

- **a. Election of the Chairman for the year 2023-2024.** Resolved to elect Councillor Parson as Chairman for the remainder of the year 2023-2024.
- **b.** Election of the Vice-Chairman for the year 2023-2024. Resolved to elect Councillor Wright as Vice-Chairman for the remainder of the year 2023-2024.

Apologies

a. Resolved to accept apologies for absence from council meetings from Councillor Thompson until the end of December 2023.

Chairman's announcements

- Councillor Morgan has chosen to stand down from the Council. His input will be missed and he is thanked for all his hard work over his term as councillor. CBC have been advised of the vacancy and all notices have been published as required.
- Mrs Thorne has decided to resign from her role as MPC Community and Environment Officer with a finish date in mid-August. Mrs Thorne has grown into and shaped this role and the Personnel Committee with find it difficult to replace her. The Chairman wished to thank Mrs Thorne for her hard work and commitment to the village in her role with them.

Public Session

Questions / comments from the public:

- The positioning of the new MPC noticeboard is poor as not everyone walks via the MPC Crackle Hill roadways from Shefford Road to the Village Hall. The reasons for putting it in this location are understandable but it is disappointing that room nearer to the Village Hall could not be found. The Chairman advised that if issues are continue to be raised, MPC will review the location.
- Who at CBC allowed the closure of Shefford Road and Shillington Road at the same time? *Clerk to investigate*.

Procedures, Consultations and Legal

a. IT and Communications - A report on website usage was circulated to councillors at the beginning of the month. The Clerk advised the councillors that Councillor Standbridge has provided the Clerk with access to Canva in order to create the Dog Barking campaign posters for Social Media. The MPC computer also required the emergency purchase of a new Mini Wireless adapter as the old one had stopped working.

Finance

a. Purchase orders

i. Resolved to book SLCC Clerks Finance training (Local Government Act 1972 s.111), cost to mark our pitches and install goal posts (Local Government

(Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 s.19, to strim Carne's copse (open Spaces Act 1906 s.10), to purchase solar powered security camera and signage for Centenary Field (Local Government and Rating Act 1997 s.31).

b. Grant applications

- i. To consider grant request from new Neighbourhood Watch scheme for marketing materials. Councillor Seaman did not participate in this agenda item. Resolved to purchase and gift marketing materials promoting Neighbourhood Watch schemes in Meppershall (Local Government and Rating Act 1997 s.31) up to cost of £125.00 +VAT.
- **c. Banking Mandate** Resolved that the Clerk action the following changes to the MPC banking mandate: remove Mr Crossley and Mr Chapman, add Councillors Avrili and Russell, provide Councillor Wright with online access to view, approve and setup payments.
- **d. Document approval** *Deferred to next meeting.*
- **e. Orders for the payment of money** Resolved that the schedules of payments as presented be approved and authorised for payment by Councillor Parsons. Carried.

Planning and Housing

a. Planning applications

- i. CB/23/01808/FULL 23 Hoo Road, SG17 5LP Two storey side and rear extensions. Resolved that the Council has no objection to planning application 23/01808.
- ii. CB/23/01724/FULL The Old Coach House, 10-12 Rectory Road, SG17 5NB Front extension to garage including insertion of roof lights, alterations to garage door, additional window to first floor and timber cladding. Resolved that the Council has no objection to planning application 23/01724.
- iii. CB/23/02119/FULL 113 High Street, SG17 5LZ Single storey front, side & rear extensions. Part two storey side & rear extension with loft extension & conversion. Resolved that the Council objects to planning application 23/02119 on the grounds of overbearing size, change to street scene, parking and other issues identified by the Clerk.
- **b.** Applications responded to under delegated powers For information only.
 - i. CB/23/01374/VOC Woodview Nurseries, SG17 5LL Variation of condition number 12 of planning permission CB/22/02944/FULL Construction of two dwellings and ancillary works. Variation is to change the approved drawings to enable revisions comprising of improved layout, provision of accommodation within the roof void and detaching previous semi-detached garages. Objection submitted to this VOC.
 - *ii.* CB/23/01199/FULL 53 High Street, SG17 5LX Proposed single storey rear extension. *No objection raised for this application.*

c. Appeals

i. Update from Cllr Wright on appeal hearing held on 27th and 28th June for APP/P0240/W/23/3317603 - CB/22/01261/OUT - 100 High Street, Meppershall, Shefford, SG17 5LZ - Outline Application: Development of 23 dwellings and associated works following the demolition of 100 High Street with all matters reserved except access, and to discuss letter to be sent to CBC concerning issues raised during the appeal. Councillor Wright attended this appeal hearing on behalf of MPC. CBC were represented by a Senior Planning Officer and consultant whilst the appellant was represented by Kings Counsel and a team of consultants. The CBC requested a postponement as they had no Kings Counsel, however after deliberation this was refused by the Inspector. The appellant's team took issue with CBC's housing delivery figures and the CBC team were unable at times to defend their position or issues raised by the appellant's team. The Clerk was asked to write to CBC to clarify their actions on the day by more importantly their housing delivery figures.

Neighbourhood Plan

a. Report - The Clerk is progressing with this.

Highways and Transport

- **a. Update on meeting with CBC Highways.** The Clerk met with the Interim Head of Highways, Councillor Stephenson and Councillor Seaman on 19th June. They discussed:
 - Invoice from CBC. More information to be provided to new Highways Team Leader.
 - Old VAS on Shefford Road removal.
 - Replacement of VAS on Shillington Road. To be discussed with new Highways Team Leader.
 - State of Shefford Road.
 - Bollard installation outside village stores. Solution to be reviewed for best option by CBC Highways.
 - Resurfacing of footpath outside 1 to 13 High Street and 2 High Street near the junction with Hill Top View. *Request passed to Highways officer to action.*

As a result of this meeting the Clerk and Councillor Thompson met with the Highways Team Leader, Traffic Management (06/07/23) to discuss:

- Invoice from CBC and reasons for MPC refusal to pay. *CBC to investigate and respond with proposed solution.*
- Redundant VAS outside 60 Shefford Road to be removed. *CBC to arrange this.*

- Requirement to reinstate VAS on Shillington Road.
- Update required on bollard installation outside village stores.
- Update required on footpath re-surfacing Brookside and Brookmead.
- Update required on footpath re-surfacing High Street.
- Update required on when Shefford Road will be resurfaced.
- b. OPCC and RMF grant funding and works update including dispute raised with CBC regarding invoice received for part of the works. The issue of the disputed invoice for highways improvement works excluding the VAS costs was discussed with both the CBC Interim Head of Highways and the new Highways Team Leader. On both occasions MPC representatives explained that the invoice received for £20,746 excluding the cost of the VAS would not be paid until all invoices had been received. If the cost of all invoices exceed the original budget proposed by MPC for the works of £23,250 then MPC would continue to dispute cost for works. The Clerk reported that she had discussed the matter with the CBC Highways Team Leader today and was expecting revised invoices in line with MPC's budget.

Resolved that the Clerk and Finance Committee arrange for payment of invoices from CBC for Highways works prior to the next meeting in September if the sum of all invoices does not exceed £23,250.

- c. Review of Survey 5 Meppershall Village Plan 2017-2027 and progress made so far. Councillors reviewed the Village Plan 2017-2027 survey results on highways. The Clerk was asked to obtain updates on Section 278 agreements from CBC.
- **d.** Update on road safety improvements on new developments Cllr Seaman, Vistry Homes (Emery Gardens) have confirmed that 20mph signage will be erected when other highways works are carried out on site. Councillor Seaman is awaiting an update from Davidsons and CBC regarding Woodlands Rest. *The Clerk was asked to email Davidsons regarding this.*

Environment and Leisure

a. To consider potential hire request for Centenary Field for fireworks display. The Clerk advised that adverts had been issued confirming a fireworks display on Centenary Field in November without the organisation making a formal application. They have been contacted regarding this. Whilst the Clerk has delegated powers to accept bookings for Centenary Field, she requested Council guidance on this matter. Resolved that MPC agree to the use of Centenary Field for a fireworks display subject to receipt of a formal application and the fulfilling of conditions including use of field (no vehicles), insurance, post event clean up within 24 hours, leafleting of neighbours, agreement of adjacent farmer, provision of risk assessment and site plan etc.

b. Update on all environmental and leisure issues.

- The Clerk has arranged the repair of the cemetery standpipe and is organising the repair of the water pipe between the water meter and new stop cock.
- The large noticeboard has been erected at the end of MPC's Crackle Hill roadway (Village Hall end) and a small noticeboard has been erected on the allotments.
- Bollards The newly installed bollard on the Crackle Hill roadway has been removed as the concrete did not set properly. The contractor is aware and will reinstall on 7th August when installing the Centenary Field path bollard. The bollards installed on Parish Council land at the entrance to Old Road Meadow have been knocked down within 24 hours of installation. An alternative solution is required that protects the gate from unauthorised access and children from vehicles using the entrance as a turning area. Resolved that the Clerk arrange the purchase and installation of a stronger bollard positioned further back together with appropriate signage and leafleting of residents.
- The pitch fencing has been damaged and will require remedial works to rectify. The Clerk may be able to complete this.
- The secondary gate of the toddlers play area is leaning in due to the corner post moving. The Clerk will arrange to have this re-concreted.
- Archie's bench on the High Street had been sanded and stained by Mrs
 Thorne but it is showing signs of damage to the wooden feet. Councillor
 Wright will look at this.
- Pitch markings and installation of goal posts will be carried out in August but this will not provide an area for playing football on the main field. Resolved that the Clerk arrange for the purchase and installation of 5 a side goals on Centenary Field.
- The Clerk advised that a new dog poo bag dispenser has been installed on the PC stores (provided free of charge by Shefford Town Council) but specific bags were required. Resolved that the Clerk arrange for the purchase of dog poo bags.

Resolved in accordance with Section 1(2) of the Public Bodies (Admission to Meetings) Act 1960, as amended that as publicity would be prejudicial to the public interest by reason of the confidential nature of the business about to be transacted at Agenda Item 939 namely to discuss and consider the nomination of a Meppershall Village Trustee it is advisable in the public interest that the Public be temporarily excluded from this meeting and they are herewith instructed to withdraw (9pm). Message from St Mary's...

It's hello again from me - Rector Roni - after some time away having a new left hip this time....And it is lovely to be back and already walking so much better.

My thanks again to all those who sent prayers and good wishes, who offered practical help and support, and who worked extra hard in Church in my absence. A special thank you to Keith and Gillian for all those extra services!

September was a "Welcome back" month for us all after the summer. We had our Patronal Festival on 10th September and National Back to Church Sunday on the 17th September. But if you are new to Church, or coming back having been away for a while we hope that you will always feel just as welcome! We aim to be a committed family at St Mary's - meeting and worshipping together, loving God, looking after one another, welcoming new members and reaching out in love and service...

1st October is our Meppershall Village Pet Blessing Service - the nearest Sunday to the day we remember Francis of Assisi, his great love of God and animals, and our Harvest Festival on 8th October with a visit from Bishop Richard the Bishop of Bedford.

October is characterised I think, by thankfulness... thanking God for the beauty of the earth, for the Harvest, for his many gifts in creation, and thanking God for the joy and the comfort brought to us by those animals we call our pets.

As usual our harvest appeal is twofold. Firstly the Need Project remains our local focus. With so many in our villages experiencing "Food Poverty" please do bring tinned and packet goods to the church to contribute to this local initiative. 773 food parcels were provided locally during August 2023 with the number of food parcels delivered up by 56% on the same time last year. Our worldwide focus is the Bishop of St Albans Harvest appeal which this year will support Mission Direct in their work in Kumi, Uganda, by providing materially poor families with chickens. The chickens provide a sustainable and low cost food source, and also provide a new income stream because families can sell some of their eggs and new chicks that hatch. If sufficient money is

raised some funds might also support other food poverty projects, like planting orchards for schools to supplement the diets of their pupils. Donations of money can be given during the Harvest Festival or 'google' Bishop of St Albans Harvest Appeal - and go to making donations.

You may also like to know that 9th - 15th October this year is *Baby Loss Awareness Week* (see baby loss-awareness.org) - "Breaking the silence around baby loss". On Friday 13th October prayers will be included during the morning service at St Michael's in Shefford at 10.30am - and there will be an opportunity to light candles and for quiet reflection through the day. St Michael's church will also be open from 7.30 - 8.30pm for those who want space to light a candle, to pray, to chat or to have a coffee in the evening.

On a different note, as many people will be thinking about their family graves for the autumn - please look out for our next Churchyard clear up day in early November. If tending your family grave please check that your memorial stone stands tall and firm and ensure your grave accords with St Albans Churchyard Regulations 2020 (updated 21). If in doubt, give me a call (contacts above).

Caring for the whole churchyard is a responsibility of the Rector and the Parochial Church Council. We see this as an important part of offering continuing, loving, spiritual and practical care to be eaved families. We aim to maintain the churchyard as a safe, welcoming place for all who use it. We thank the Parish Council and all our volunteer mowers and carers for all their hard work. We hope that together we can maintain the churchyard as a place which truly honours the memory of those buried there. (Please note: To achieve that from time to time we may remove items which do not comply with regulations, are hazardous, or which appear way past their best). Hoping that your October is filled with much to be thankful for.

Shefford Osteopathic Clinic: Why Do We Get Injured?

When we exercise and move we stress our tissues, causing damage. We need rest to allow our muscle fibres, tendons and ligaments to repair and become stronger. If we cause too much damage in one go — or allow too little time for that recovery — then niggles start.

If you're feeling pain, something needs to be addressed and corrected.

Tips to prevent injury:

- 1) Increase activity by 10% a week. Keep your weekly runs the same distance, increasing your weekend run by 10% each week. Increase weights only as your technique allows.
- 2) **New equipment.** Initially, mix your old and new equipment (bike, trainers, racket) but avoid increased training intensity during this transition.
- 3) **After you've been ill or injured** reduce your training initially. Avoid doing too much too soon. You can build back up again quickly; give your body the chance to catch up.

- 4) **Rest days** ideally, rest for 1–2 days weekly.
- 5) **Change only one variable** of your training each week. Time, distance, speed, weight ... master one, then challenge another aspect.

The most important thing is to love your body:

- Move because you can.
- Rest to get stronger.
- Fuel your body with the foods it loves and needs.

GP Practices: Accurx Patient Triage Update

We are fortunate to have all our local GP surgeries (Shefford, Lower Stondon and Larksfield Partnership) now using the Accurx online triage system for non-urgent appointments and query requests. Thousands of triage requests have been processed and the feedback from both staff and patients has been positive. This system enables patients to make requests in their own time, instantly accessing NHS self-help resources and avoiding the morning telephone queues.

The online form is quick and easy to use for appointments, medical and admin queries such as recent blood test results, repeat prescriptions, requesting a fit note etc.

Your practice will contact you by the end of the **second working day** after submitting your form, and quicker if it is more urgent. You will be offered an appointment, advice, or help accessing the appropriate healthcare service.

If you do not have access to the internet or struggle with completing online forms, please call the surgery and they will complete the form on your behalf.

Please note: When submitting a triage request it may be 48 working hours for a response, staff will red flag any urgent clinical queries. If you are unable to wait because your condition is urgent then consider the walk-in Centre or A&E.

Please do not submit several requests for the same issue, this impacts the time it takes for the triage team to get through the queries.

111 online offers advice online if you're not sure whether you need to see a doctor or nurse, please visit <u>Get help for your symptoms - NHS 111</u>

Ensure your surgery has your up-to-date mobile number when submitting your request and keep an eye for a response message or appointment details. You may be called directly by the clinician triaging. When offered an appointment, please do all you can to attend the appointment or cancel the appointment to ensure it can be offered to another patient. Please remember all queries are triaged by a clinician, if the advice is to attend UCC or A&E this is because this has been deemed the appropriate clinical advice; occasionally you may be signposted to a walk-in centre or urgent care if there are no same-day appointments available.

We are mindful that winter will soon be upon us, prepare now for your family during winter months; be aware of which conditions can be seen or treated by your local pharmacy or other NHS services.



There is such a variety and they are so easy to plant for years of enjoyment to come. The bulbs may look boring now but wait until spring when these minimiracles spring to life!

Plants that give seasonal interest now, that you can have in your garden whether it is big or small, are Japanese acers. These can either be kept in pots or replanted in the ground. They have a graceful dome-like canopy, spectacular colours and gorgeous foliage. They like to be mulched with ericaceous soil and kept somewhere sheltered and shady. I have a customer that has two acers that were planted in 1914 in her lawn and are breathtaking. They are underplanted with bulbs, so pretty in the Spring.

Sedums are great and are very low maintenance. Just cut back once a year after the frosts, as they look attractive with frost on and also this helps to protect the plant.

They have succulent fleshy leaves with flat nectar rich pink flowerheads that the bees love.

These are lovely alongside Michaelmas Daisies and ornamental grasses and you may also have some sunflowers still hanging on that would complement this selection of plants. You can leave the sunflowers so the birds can enjoy foraging the seeds.

Enjoy your garden and your produce and buy some spring bulbs!

Communion of the Infinite by Martin Blandy

Passing through 7,000 feet the cold traces around my shades - focused forever skyward, each mirrored lens duplicates the azure infinity. There is no place I would rather be.

Above, other than the atmosphere, all that sits between me and space are microscopic shoals of sifting ice crystals forming cirrus clouds. Ahead, though cumuliform canyons and over the toothpick turbines of the 'Middle Levels,' I can see as far as the Wash. The blues of the sky and the sea fuse at the horizon.

The temperature continues to drop as we continue our lonely excursion. I could switch on the heater, but I prefer the cold - it helps me focus. This is important as to be a pilot is to be utterly present. Every sensation matters.

Beyond the cold, more agreeable sensations include the reassuring vibration of the CT's engine through the seat, the supportive weight and heft of invisible air made tangible through the control surfaces and stick, as well as the whisper of rarefied air as it speeds over the wings. A meditative mix of sinusoids and white noise.

'Grounding' me further in airborne meditation is the repetitive cycle of the 'pilot scan'. In this you are forced to tenaciously inspect the world. The horizon is first packaged into frames in your mind then each frame is scanned with your eyes for fellow aircraft like sweeping a RADAR, taking perhaps 10-15 seconds. After breathing deeply of the sky, the pilot then turns their gaze inside for a second, sweeping quickly over the instruments to check the aircrafts vitals - airspeed (speed = life), engine temperatures and the remaining fuel level — eyes hypersensitive to any yellows or reds. The cycle then repeats.

Another 10 scans of focused attention and the altimeter ticks past 10,000 feet. Meditation paused, it's time to stop.

Trimmed to climb the CT resists my forward push - it knows it has more to give and is sending a playful "Come on" challenge through the stick.

"Very Funny CT," I mutter, sidetone coming back into my headset. I want to continue too; however, I'd soon start to become faint for lack of oxygen risking motor control, judgement and a gradual but ever tightening spiral back to earth (permanent Shavasana!).

Winning the juvenile arm wrestle (and promising to come back with an oxygen canister) I level off and re-trim. The CT quickly shakes off its disappointment and, totally unfazed by the climb, accelerates to a true air speed of 170 knots.

It is just thankful to be flying - and so am I.

Arcing across our invisible plateau and purified of petty concerns, we hold communion with the infinite.



The CT2K is a Three-Axis Microlight – Three-Axis refers to the controls surfaces you would have in a traditional aircraft permitting pitch, roll and yaw. A preconception that people have when they hear the word microlight is the image of a hang-glider with a human and a lawnmower engine suspended under it – this type is called a Flex-Wing. There is nothing wrong with those! But these are also available. Why not give either a go.

I will write more details in another article but in the meantime check out The British Microlight Aircraft Association (bmaa.org)

How (Not) to Become a Secret Agent (Part II) by Patrick O'Connor

A year or so after our Russian military friend had been sent home I received a phone call. It was from my government minder. Nikolai (not his real name) was back in London, apparently a very unusual event. Could we find a way to "accidentally" make contact? As it happened, I had spotted that there was to be a memorial service for the World War 2 Pathfinder force, the bomber crews who led the raids on German targets, at the RAF church at St. Clement Danes in London. My minder confirmed that Nikolai was scheduled to attend as his country's representative.

A plan was hatched. My wife and I would attend: long ago while in the RAF I had been a member of the Pathfinder Club, just because it offered cheap London accommodation. So I positioned myself in the Clement Danes car park, joined by another agent. He had his radio on, and I could hear the reports of Nikolai's progress to the church. It was a bitterly cold morning and I was shivering. My wife was being taken care of by a lady agent in a café nearby.

"He is just arriving at the church" I heard on the radio. I saw the big black car turning off the Strand. My agent vanished. Nikolai stepped out. "Nikolai" I said, in great feigned surprise. He greeted me heartily (maybe it was not a surprise to him?) I explained that I was waiting for Ina to join me for the service. Sure enough, my wife just happened to arrive. We all went happily into the church.

After the service Nikolai drove us to his London apartment, and contact was happily re-made. Later I reported the good news to my minder.

So our social round with the Warsaw Pact and with the British government agency picked up again. Doing one's duty for Queen and Country was not burdensome. But, despite further hints and inducements, Nikolai remained loyal. Then again he was posted back suddenly, and we did not manage to say our goodbyes.

I often wondered what happened to him in the years after the end of the Cold War. I tried Googling him, but to no avail. Maybe now, an old man like me, he tells his version of this story over a vodka.

Cineaste's Corner: Under The Skin. by Dave Peters

Director Jonathan Glazer's "Under the Skin" (2013) is a sci-fi film that, although a great critical success, was a relative commercial failure. I thought it was terrific when I first saw it and repeat viewings have reinforced this opinion. A disturbing and erotic sci-fi story, it stars Scarlett Johansson as a predatory alien driving around the streets of Glasgow picking up unattached men to lure back to an abandoned house where they meet a grisly fate. Johansson is excellent in the lead role; she doesn't say much but is on screen the whole time and is a compelling presence.



The film starts with an impressionistic birth sequence where the alien appears to be transforming into a human being and learning to speak. Once 'born' and standing naked in a bare white room a mysterious motorcyclist delivers the comatose (dead?) body of another young woman who Johansson strips and uses the clothes to dress

herself. We don't know who the other woman is, but the suspicion is that she is being 'replaced' by Johansson.

The motorcyclist gives Johansson the keys to a white van which she then uses to tour the streets of Glasgow seeking out and picking up her victims. She uses her sultry beauty to lure them to an abandoned house, but as they follow her in, and as she walks ahead sensually removing her clothes, they slowly sink into a still pitch-black pool where they are literally consumed.

An unusual feature of the film is that Glazer placed hidden cameras in the van and filmed some interactions between Johansson and real Glaswegian men as she improvised dialogue about being in need of directions while attempting to get them to join her in the vehicle. Glazer only sought the men's permission to use this footage after the scenes had actually been shot. Johansson's black wig and soft English accent were obviously enough to disguise from them that they were potentially being picked up by a genuine Hollywood A-lister.


The alien initially displays no emotion as she lures her victims to their doom. Probably the most shocking demonstration of this is where she is at a beach, the sea is very stormy, and she is talking to a man in a wetsuit who has been swimming. He sees another man trying to rescue his drowning wife who in turn was trying to rescue their dog. He runs off and is able to pull the man out of the sea, but is too exhausted to save the woman, inevitably the husband runs back into the sea in a forlorn effort to save her. Meanwhile the man in the wetsuit is lying exhausted on the shore. Johansson picks up a rock and callously knocks him out before dragging him off to her van, oblivious to the tragedy happening only yards away.

It gradually becomes apparent that the alien is undergoing a form of awakening and is starting to become more human the longer she inhabits human form. This becomes evident when she picks up a man with a major facial disfigurement and, after leading him into the house, decides to release him due to her compassion for his physical condition and obvious loneliness. Knowing that her motorcyclist minder will discover this she abandons the van and heads into the Scottish countryside where she tries to blend in by eating human food (not a success), watching TV, and attempting to have sex with a guy who has offered her shelter (this also doesn't go well).

This is a riveting, challenging and visually breathtaking film about what it means to be


human - do we ever really see who and what is under the skin? It is also one of Scarlett Johansson's best performances as she conveys so much while saying so little. The brilliant sound track by Mica Levi also deserves a special mention.

"Under the Skin" is an underrated film that will hopefully one day be recognised as the sci-fi masterpiece it is. It's available to rent on several platforms but with its adult themes and content, and its genuinely shocking ending, it's definitely not one for the kids.


